
He Is Risen Indeed!!




The Rainbow Fish Marcus Pfister

Appearance

But the LORD said to Samuel, "Do not consider his appearance or his height, for I have rejected him. The LORD does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart." I Samuel 16:7

Not long ago, I worked briefly with a client who had recently moved to Delaware from New Jersey. In the course of her describing the challenges that come with such a move, which I have heard from many others over the years, there was one particular complaint that was certainly a new one for me. Laughingly, she said, "....and I blame HGTV for much of my difficulty in selling my house. If it weren't for those house shows, people wouldn't be so caught up in the minor cosmetic details. While I had to spend on repairs to the essentials that needed fixing, like the heating and air, it was the surface points that I had to invest in to make the house attractive for potential buyers. I was told that if the house didn't show well, it wouldn't sell."

While a humorous tale to hear in many ways, (easy for me to find the humor, given it was not me struggling to break even on a house sale!), the house story caused me to think a bit broader about the importance of appearance, especially in our society today. How something appears on the surface matters. Being able to catch the attention of others seems to be a common guest of many today. The means of accomplishing this, or at least attempting to, is beyond easy, even for the least technology savvy amongst us. It's impossible for me to check my email, it seems, without seeing a scrolling stream of pictures, featuring the supposedly available singles in my geographic area. I can't access my network homepage without having to encounter the latest round of amateur video options of folks who obviously have their phones at the ready, looking for, well, something eye catching; something that will generate a stir, maybe something that will get picked up by one of the networks; who really knows. What are we really looking for in how we appear to others; what we are presenting on the surface? There is always a reason why we do what we do, although those reasons are often hidden, to some degree, beneath, in some emotional closet within us. What are we longing to feel... is it attractive or important, is it smart or sophisticated, or any

number of other possibilities; emotional hunger areas that are hidden away, but play out unconsciously, and increasingly, on the surface areas of life.

I had a session recently with a young married couple. The young man came to the session dressed rather fashionably, spoke in a very subdued, cultured tone... overall, presented quite well. And, as the session unfolded, the truth of why this couple needed counseling eventually rose to the surface.... the



husband had been unfaithful to his wife. Once again, presentation doesn't match the truth, and while others who don't know the truth of this situation, and see this young man and his pristine presentation, are going to likely draw their own surface based conclusions, but they won't be based on reality, but rather, on appearance. The sad thing in this particular case, was that there was so little shame or remorse demonstrated. This young man appeared as if floating on the surface of a pool, light and buoyant through his façade of competence and sincerity, but unattached to the anchor of truth, which is grounded in reality and accountability. How easy it is to be adrift on life's waters when we are unconnected to our anchor in Christ.

In our humanity, given that God gave us our eyes to see, we are in fact vulnerable to see what we want to see; to see what the surface presents, and unfortunately, stopping there. Even the Scriptures tell of stories that bear this out, as we read about the "beautiful" Rachel or Queen Esther, or the "handsome" Joseph, of the Old Testament, or young David. But our very same Scriptures, in various spots within the sacred text, challenge us to …have the eyes to see, and ears to hear. And what exactly does this mean to us? Quite simply, the ability, spiritually, to go beyond what we see and hear, or more accurately, to go below;

to the inner part of the person, where the truth and heart of that person can be found.

As many of you may already know, in the Gospels, the four separate accounts of Jesus' life and ministry on this earth, there is no surface description used that gives us a sense, a true image, of what our Lord actually looked like. And while we have likely seen numerous artistic renderings of Jesus with all manner of eye color, hair color, facial characteristics, and the like, these impressions are solely based on human creativity and imagination. What we do know of Jesus from the Gospels are mere glimpses into the inner self of our Savior, aspects that don't simply lie along the surface for display, but are treasures of depth, riches that are searched out through spirit-filled connection... And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him. Luke 2:40 Not the most exciting or noteworthy of descriptions, but, in fact, the simple, unassuming ingredients of our Savior; no bright lights or fireworks required.

Jesus encouraged us, even challenged us, maybe, to not fall prey to the allure of appearance, lest we be no better than... whitewashed tombs, or overly concerned with... the outside of the cup and dish, while the inside is full of greed and self-indulgence. Matthew 23:27; 25. We have eyes... yes. But, do we need the blindness of Saul to compel us to use them as God desires of us? The more we draw near to our Lord in this life, the less likely we are to get snagged by the surface diversions that beckon us at seemingly every turn in the road.

Dear God,

help us not to settle for the trivial distractions that the world persistently produces, which can obscure our vision and occupy our thoughts. But let our eyes continually hunger for the face of Christ; searching beyond the hollow fanfare and fantasy of this life, to the truth and depth of His never failing love.

Be a Part of the Flame

One of our youth ministries here at Wyoming Church is \mathfrak{MYF} (Methodist Youth Fellowship). \mathfrak{MYF} currently meets three times a month. The junior high (6th-8th grades) meets once, the senior high (9th-12th grades) meets once, and one time the two groups meet together.

Our purpose for \mathfrak{MYF} is to provide a time of fellowship together, to nurture one another and have some fun. A typical session begins with a devotional time, then we go over upcoming events in the youth ministry, have a recreational activity, and finish with a snack. Some of our recent MYFsessions featured Bowling Pin Dodgeball, Mystery Clue Hunt, and a movie day. Bowling Pin Dodgeball is a fast-paced game in which the group is divided into two teams. A team wins a round either by knocking down all the other team's bowling pins or knocking everyone on the other team out following the rules of regular dodgeball. We do play with gator skin and nerf balls to avoid injuries and damage to the FLC. Wes Faircloth was probably the MVP of the game as he showed off a strong arm probably developed from all those years playing baseball and softball and from last summer's basic training. (Wes will be full time in the army at the end of this school year.) Dave Schoettinger was doing security watch and enjoyed watching the game so much that we had him join us for a few rounds.

Another recent \mathfrak{MYF} session was Mystery Clue Hunt. In this game, the participants were divided into teams of about 5 each. Clues were scattered around the different rooms of the church. Each clue gave a hint as to either who did something, what was done, how it was done, where it was done, or to whom it was done. Ms. Betsy came up with the mystery and clues. The youth were divided into 4 groups, while the remaining adults (Jeff, Tracey, and myself) were a fifth group. Despite a couple minutes head start as the youth got their teams organized, the adults were the last group finished. Must be those sharp eyes of those young people as we took a long time to find some of the clues.

In closing, I want to offer a special thinks to Mindy Anthony for stepping in to help me with the Jr. High MYF movie day. I had to leave early to go down to a Chrysalis closing, and she graciously came in and stayed with the group.

I have been sharing with you about the Sticky Faith movement and what it means for the students God has entrusted to Wyoming Church. I've shared a bit about their first major theme in the past two newsletters: a Sticky Gospel that focuses on grace rather than behaviors.

Today I'd like to share about the next theme: **intergenerational relationships**.

Research shows that intergenerational worship and relationships are linked with faith that sticks. That is, the more students join in worship side by side with people who are older and younger than them, the better. And the more students know and are known by adults, the better. But that only happens when students are connected to the rest of the church.

The problem is that many of our students don't know the church well; they are only strongly connected with the youth group or their Sunday school class.

Sometimes youth ministry can feel a bit like an adults' table and a kids' table at a family gathering. The adults have

the "real meal" in one place while the kids are put in a separate location altogether, holding separate conversations and unaware of anything the adults say (and vice-versa).

Of course we are not calling for an end to youth ministry (I love my job!), but a faithful response to the research requires the whole church to find more ways to come around one table as a faith family. **Ideally each young person will be surrounded by a team of five adults that consistently support and walk with that young person.** (I'll share more about that in the next newsletter.)

The Sticky Faith Launch Team has come up with a plan to improve the intergenerational connections at Wyoming Church. For now, I'd love for you to consider new ways our church could invite more young people to be part of what's happening around our community. I'd really love to hear your ideas, so could you let me know about where you could see more connections potentially develop between adults and teenagers?

Elton was an amazing volunteer and many nights stayed all night at the shelter which gave us one more person to rely on, in addition to our 2 volunteers assigned to be there.

In the beginning, Amy and I cautioned Elton that he was spoiling our volunteers, but he just smiled and said "It's no problem. I'm glad to do it."

I am sure he got tired of lugging the inflatable beds out each night and pumping them up

when they lost air. He took care of the bed linens and blankets and pillows and made sure everything got bagged up to go to the laundry. He then helped put everything away and cleaned the restrooms. Elton didn't get paid to do this work; he did it out of the goodness of his heart and because he wanted to help others.

We keep a log for the volunteers to fill out with any needs or suggestions they may have at the conclusion of their shift. Many of the comments in the log were: "Elton is amazing! Made our job so much easier! ... Elton is a huge help! ... Elton is a BIG help! ... As usual, Elton is a fantastic help!"

What a joy it has been working with Elton during this **Code Purple** season. How fortunate we are to have such a dedicated volunteer as part of Wyoming's **Code Purple** Sanctuary!! God bless you, Elton Pumphrey!

The Food Pantry Program is Continuing! By Carol Abbott

On February 26, 2016, members of the Food Pantry Team and Food Pantry Volunteers met to discuss options for the Food Pantry after the death of leader Kathy Swift. Many possibilities were discussed including ending the food pantry. That option was unanimously defeated! However, it was noted that we have not been serving as many hungry families over the last year as we have in the past. While Food Pantry Volunteers have continued to be on call for an entire month, in the past year they rarely have had more than one or two calls for food for the month. Angela Donastorg explained to the group that the church hadn't been getting as many calls for assistance since Social Services started moving to a voucher program. They screen families for need and give qualifying families and individuals a voucher detailing where they can go for emergency food assistance. Angela explained that the churches and food pantry organizations in the area that choose to help with the voucher program can specify how many families

they wish to serve as well as select what days and hours they will be available to collect vouchers and distribute food.

That means that the screening will be done for us, we can specify exactly what days and hours we will distribute food, and we can decide in advance how many families we would like to help. That takes the burden of screening off our office staff, limits our volunteers' time commitment to a manageable few hours on two days of the month, and increases the number of families served. Our group decided that serving **more** people **more** efficiently would be a great idea for everyone concerned.

We decided to start by helping two families of 1 to 4 individuals on both the second and fourth Thursday of the month (four families total) between the hours of 2:00 to 3:00 PM. [Note: If families are large, Social Services could give the big family both vouchers for the one day.] Two volunteers will work together to receive the vouchers and distribute the food each time at a table in the Family Life Center. Substitutes can be called if volunteers for the month cannot be present. We hope to get this new system going in April.

While many of our Food Pantry Volunteers are continuing to take their



turn giving out groceries, we have some months still needing volunteers to take vouchers and distribute groceries. Volunteers will only be needed on the second and fourth Thursday of the month. In addition to the one hour sitting in the Family Life Center twice a month, they will need to buy the fresh items (which can be charged at the Camden-Wyoming Grocery to the Food Pantry budget) and select the dry goods from the Food Pantry shelves. Substitutes are also needed. If you are interested in volunteering for this program, please call Linda Pape at 270-0210.




