From the Pastor's Desk

There is a line to an old hymn that says, "Prayer is the soul's sincere desire, unuttered or expressed; the motion of a hidden fire that trembles in the breast." The author, James Montgomery, evidently found prayer to be a relatively easy thing, as simple as breathing as he would later in the song say that prayer "is the Christian's native air." If that is the case then why do so many of us sometimes struggle with our prayer lives? Over the years I have had many people come to me to express that they were really struggling with prayer—they couldn't find the time to pray, they never remembered to pray, they couldn't find the words to say when they prayed, they weren't sure if God was listening...and the list could go on and on. If prayer is so simple, how can it be so hard and frustrating at the same time?

I take heart in the fact that Jesus' disciples struggled with prayer as well. All these men were brought up in the Jewish faith and we active in their local synagogues. They had spent their entire lives praying, and yet after joining with Jesus and spending time with him they felt like their prayer were lacking. So in Luke 11, one of them steps forward and says to Jesus, "Lord, teach us to pray." Jesus responded by giving them the words of what we now call the Lord's Prayer.

At those times when we feel like our prayer life is lacking, here are a few things that can help.

First, take the time to pray every day. Set an alarm on your
phone if you have to, but make sure you
make the time every day.

Second, remember that prayer is nothing more than a conversation with God. If you can talk to your spouse or a friend, you can talk to God—there is no special language or magic formula. God just



wants to hear from you!

Third, when you can't think of what to pray, start with the Lord's Prayer and add in your own words. Jesus' words help us find a way to say thank you to God, to ask for forgiveness, to praise the Lord, and to ask for things we need from God.

God loves to hear your voice - make sure you pray every day!

on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.






Pastor Dave's Ministry Minute - August 2016

Struggles

²⁴ So Jacob was left alone, and a man wrestled with him till daybreak. ²⁵ When the man saw that he could not overpower him, he touched the socket of Jacob's hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man. ... ³⁰ So Jacob called the place Peniel, ¹¹ saying, "It is because I saw God face to face, and yet my life was spared. ³¹ The sun rose above him as he passed Peniel, ¹² and he was limping because of his hip. Genesis 32

At one of our monthly lunches, a counseling colleague of mine was discussing marital counseling, concluding his varied thoughts by saying, "You know, couples need to disagree some; the struggle keeps them working together; it keeps them as partners in their relationship." I couldn't agree more. And while struggle may not be desired, in our humanness, the "struggle" allows the two people a chance to keep the relationship in balance, not tilting too far in one direction or the other.

I thought further about the struggle theme, seeing how this plays out so naturally in the parent/child relationship. It caused me to remember many years ago when our daughter was only three or four. My wife

and I were sitting in on the adult Sunday school class one Sunday morning, only to have our daughter wander into our group, obviously upset and on the verge of tears. Looking for consolation, she hurried over to my wife, received a pat on the head and a word of encouragement, and as swiftly as she had appeared, she disappeared just as quickly back to her classroom, problem solved. My friend next to me, the father of two teenagers, said laughing, "Enjoy it while it lasts... now that my boys are teens, I've come to realize that I'm really not that smart anymore!"

The parenting journey can be a struggle at times, more for some than others, and more intensely at certain ages than others. Much like an anonymous quote I read recently, "Adolescence is a period of rapid changes. Between the ages of 12 and 17, for example, a parent ages as much as 20 years." A bit of humor and truth in those few words! A child is going to struggle with their parents in an effort, typically, to gain a greater sense of independence; to differentiate themselves; to establish themselves apart from their family unit and/or the family dynamics. The degree of this process varies depending on the personality of the child and the health of the home environment, but in actuality, this is a necessary process, so that the child can continue to grow and develop as a person. Unfortunately, this earthly process often takes place with our heavenly Father, as well.

Unlike our human attachments, our attachment to God is not meant to be a struggle or a spiritual tug of war, although it can easily become just that. Like Jacob from our lead scripture, we can wrestle with God, wanting life our way, only to walk away from the struggle with a limp.

Like Martha when she shortsightedly challenged Jesus as he approached Bethany, how can we fully understand the Lord and His workings? How can we know what God is trying to accomplish through our lives and our life circumstances? How easily we can push for what

makes sense to us. How easy it is to struggle with God.

As a father of teenagers now, I feel as though I have watched most of the Disney movies ever made. I remember a scene from a movie called Cars II, where a lovable, rust-covered tow truck named Mater is preparing to be repainted for an important mission at the movie's climax. When an attempt was made to repair the dents and scars along his frame prior to painting, he quickly objected, saying that the dents and imperfections reminded him of the adventures he had with his best friend Lightning McQueen, the hero of the movie. He didn't want to forget the adventures.



While we may not have Mater's rust colored dents or dings, or walk with a noticeable limp like Jacob, if we have a heart for the Lord and have attempted to walk with Him while making our way through this imperfect world, we probably have other "scars" to speak of that we have collected over time; reminders of our struggles with God; our wrestling matches with God to have life our own way, and on our own terms. It can be so easy to forget that our lives are simply on loan from God, not an arrangement of permanence, but a very temporary gift that we've been provided.

May we continually trade the anxieties and expectations of this world for the peace that comes when we choose to live our lives for God, awaiting our ultimate completion in Him when our

The Outreach Team has recently been advised of a local

community movement to ensure that the homeless have at least one meal a day. There are many efforts throughout our area that assist in this project, such as the Salvation Army, various churches, Dover Mission for Housing, the Dover Interfaith Resource Center, etc.

However, you will all agree that one meal a day is really not enough. For this reason, faith communities throughout our area are being asked to prepare "brown bag" lunches that might be distributed at the Dover Interfaith Resource Center where many homeless people go each day.

Ideally, if 30 faith communities committed to preparing a number of brown bags one day a month, we could keep our community from going hungry.

HERE IS THE CHALLENGE, WYOMING CHURCH:

.lf just 12 small groups within our church committed to preparing 40-50 brown bag lunches one day a month, we could involve a lot of people and help to feed the hungry. JUST THINK??? Each group would only have to prepare one day a year if we have 12 groups participating.

Who are our small groups??

Knitting to Nurture, Ladies' Bible Study, Choir, SS classes, Book Group, Visitation Team, Liturgists, ACCESS Team, Nurses' Christian Fellowship, Friday morning Bible Study group, ASL group, Youth Groups, Kitchen Sexton Team, etc. These are just ones that I thought of....there are so many more!!

Since this article went out over email, I have had several groups step up to the plate...Couples in Action, Visitation Team, a local 4-H group,

MOPS and perhaps, ASL class. We are almost halfway there!! Won't your group consider taking on one day a year??

We encourage you to discuss this with your groups and pick your month. The day of the month has not been determined at this time, but if your group is interested in participating, contact Judy Field at (302) 242-3382 or by email at warren.judy@comcast.net. Once groups have committed, we can come up with a schedule and a list of suggestions for lunches will be shared with the group. We only have to prepare and deliver to the Resource Center in Dover, next to the Dover Interfaith Mission for Housing.

BIG CHANGES A-COMING

How many of us are familiar with our church's mission statement? It reads as follows:

Jesus Christ is the center of every program. Our work is to present His life and message in a variety of ways. Our aim is to lead each member into expressing his or her faith through regular worship, Christian studies and nurture, daily witness and service to others, in all that we do to try to make known the saving love of lesus Christ and to commend Him Lord of All!

Did you catch that middle part about regular worship and study? Unfortunately, for our members that are youth, many of you were not involved in regular worship and study. You would be either in Sunday school or church at 9:45 missing one in order to attend the other. That is not in line with our mission statement.

So after various discussions culminating with our Youth Council meeting on July 19th, a decision was made concerning youth in grades 6 through 12. Sunday school classes will no longer be held for 6th through 12th grades at 9:45. Instead, MYF will meet regularly on Sunday evenings from 6:00 to 8:00 with 45 minutes

of that time given over to study. (The remaining time will be for fun activities, snacking, and socializing.) This way, more youth will have an opportunity to participate in Sunday worship on a regular basis. Also it will see MYF being held at a regular time and on a regular day making it easier to keep track of when we will be meeting.

Another change concerns Synago. We will be replacing Synago with an intergenerational Bible study that will meet on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday evenings of each month from 7:00 to 8:30.

This study will begin on September 21st. The fall study is When Christians Get It Wrong, authored by Adam Hamilton. This study looks at why young people are leaving the church and how we can address it. The study is 6 sessions long.

So to sum up, Sunday morning Sunday school for 6th through 12th graders will no longer be offered. MYF will be held regularly on Sunday evenings from 6:00 to 8:00 and will feature a study time as a part of it. There will be an intergenerational Bible study on the first and third Wednesday evenings from 7:00 to 8:30.



Sharing Your Spiritual Journey

One of the great traditions of the church throughout time has been to share our personal stories with one another. Whether we call that our story, testimony, or spiritual journey, we tell each other about how we have (and at times have not) seen God working.

Sharing these stories encourages other people, helping them to articulate things about their

own lives or to know that they are not alone in their experience.

The same is true with your kids.
They need to hear about your
spiritual journey even, and
perhaps especially, if it has been
challenging. Hearing this from a
parent can be particularly
powerful for a young person.

Do your kids know your testimony of how you became a follower of Jesus? Do they know why you still follow Jesus today? Knowing that narrative can strengthen your kids' own

narrative of faith. Even if you aren't sure about your own relationship with Jesus right now, being honest with your son or daughter can open doors to explore faith together.

This week, I want to invite you to share more about your faith with your child. If you don't know where to start, maybe on the next car ride together you could just finish this sentence with them: "Have I ever told you how I decided to follow Jesus?" Then tell them.

Carros Surprise

Ever since Pastor Rick's first sermon at Wyoming Church on July 3rd, we've been waiting for the disclosure of this secret, most delightful dish - here it is, from the Wyoming Church Cookbook

Recipes so Remember (2005) - enjoy!

Ingredients:

2 pounds large carrots

2 sticks margarine

6 eggs

1 1/2 cup sugar

1 tbsp. baking powder

6 tbsp. flour

3 tsp. vanilla extract

Butter large $(13 \times 9 \times 1 \ 1/2 \ \text{inch})$ glass baking pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Peel and slice carrots. Cook in boiling water until tender. Remove from heat and drain.

Place half of the carrots in a food

processor and add 1 stick margarine. Process until smooth. Add 3 eggs, 3/4 cup sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 3 tablespoons flour, and 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla. Process again until well blended. Set aside in a large bowl.

Repeat the same process for the other half of carrots, margarine, eggs, sugar, baking powder, flour, and vanilla.

Pour into the large bowl with the first half of mixture. Blend well. Spoon mixture into buttered glass pan.

Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until center is firm. You may garnish cooked top with pecans or other nuts of choice.


