The Power of Pentecost

The very first sermon I ever preached was at my home church in Middletown on Pentecost Sunday back in (I think) the year 2003. I had graduated from college back in January and I was preparing to pack up and move to Kentucky that fall to start seminary. On that Sunday I talked about how the disciples must have felt in Acts 1. Jesus has just passed the baton of ministry and leadership for the future of the Christian movement on to them, and then he leaves them to return to heaven. In that moment they must have been scared—scared that they wouldn't

be able to do what he asked, scared that they were going to let him down, and perhaps even scared of what might happen if they were successful. They weren't scared for long though, because when the Holy Spirit comes upon them in Acts 2 everything changed. Where there had once been a ragtag group of uncertain and scared people, there now stood a band of committed, fearless leaders that were ready to do everything they could to glorify Christ.

I think all of us as Christians struggle with those same feelings and questions: God, am I doing what you ask of me? God, did I let you down? Jesus, I'm afraid. God asks a great deal of us, so how can we be sure that we are up to the task of serving him? What made the difference for those first disciples is the same thing that makes all the difference



for us: the Holy Spirit's power and presence in our hearts and lives. Apart from the Spirit we can do nothing. I can't deliver God's Word apart from the Spirit's influence and guidance. Pastor Dave can't sing without the Spirit of God in his heart. Jennifer can't minister to our nursery children without the love of God and the Spirit's wisdom. We can't worship, study, or give glory to Jesus Christ if the Spirit isn't present. Thanks be to God for the gift of the Spirit - may we tap into the Spirit's power every day so that we can worship and serve the Lord with gladness in our hearts.

No Raffles in Church?

Everything you've always wanted to know about the United Methodists

As more and more people come to the United Methodist Church from other denominations rather than having 'grown up' Methodist, they are not as familiar with the policies and guidelines of our denomination, and even lifelong Methodists can't possibly remember every last UMC rule and regulation, especially as those have been modified and adapted through the years at Annual Conference.

That being said, The United Methodist Church does have clear 'Social Principles' on the different areas of personal and community life which we as Wyoming UMC, of course, commit ourselves to observing.

Starting this month, we are going to highlight different areas of life and church and the respective United Methodist point of view.

Gambling

Gambling is a menace to society, deadly to the best interests of moral, social, economic, and spiritual life, destructive of good government and

good stewardship. As an act of faith and concern, Christians should abstain from gambling and should strive to minister to those victimized by the practice. Where gambling has become addictive, the Church will encourage such individuals to receive therapeutic assistance so that the individual's energies may be redirected into positive and constructive ends. The Church acknowledges the dichotomy that can occur when opposing gambling while supporting American Indian tribal sovereignty and self-determination. Therefore, the Church's role is to create sacred space to allow for dialogue and education that will promote a holistic understanding of the American Indians' historic quest for survival. The Church's prophetic call is to promote standards of justice and advocacy that would make it unnecessary and undesirable to resort to commercial gambling including public lotteries, casinos, raffles, Internet gambling, gambling with an emerging wireless technology and other games of chance - as a recreation, as an escape, or as a means of producing public revenue or funds for support of charities or government.

Update Help Lindsay Fight Lyme Disease

As many of you know, our daughter, Lindsay, suffers from Chronic Lyme Disease. She is currently a patient of the Jemsek Speciality Clinic in Washington, D.C. In April, she began a treatment protocol of IV antibiotics (in addition to other therapies) that is expected to last nine to ten months. Lindsay is now on her journey to wellness! We hope and pray her health will be completely restored!

As health insurance will not cover any Chronic Lyme treatments, Lindsay must pay for this very expensive treatment herself. It is estimated that her IV drugs alone will cost approximately \$75,000, and she was required to put down a \$39,000 deposit to begin the therapy.

To assist Lindsay in raising funds to complete her treatment and continue her therapies, there are two options: a soon-to-end **quilt raffle** (NOT THROUGH WYOMING CHURCH!! see article on top) and an **ongoing online fundraiser**.
