From the Pastor's Desk







Reflections

Reflections Seeking ...?

...the one who seeks finds. Matthew 7:8



Can it really be December already? It's as if the days are falling away all the faster as the end of this year approaches. Thanksgiving... already a calendar casualty. And so, with our seat belts buckled, all we can do is

hang on for the sprint to the Christmas finish line. Oh, but what a finish we can expect as we race our way through the blur of festive decorations, the thoughtful greeting cards from family and friends, the joyful celebrations, and the memorable traditions of this much anticipated holy season.

One of our family's special traditions leading up to Christmas is watching the Dickens classic A Christmas Carol on Christmas Eve night. Like any favorite movie seen over and over again, scenes and story lines become seared into memory over time, and that is surely the case with this holiday standard. For those familiar with the movie adaptation, and we prefer the 1984 version by the way, the scene of Scrooge sitting behind his Counting House desk, rifling through his overflowing stacks of gold coins, has certainly become the iconic image of greed and miserliness.

Among the many memorable scenes in the story, I have recently found myself thinking especially about the exchanges between Scrooge and the third of the visiting ghosts, the Ghost of Christmas Future. In his interactions with this particular ghost, Scrooge is witnessing, with much agitation and hurt pride, the very limited impact he had on the world around him while living. His associates deride his memory and grieve not, his possessions

are stolen and sold for scant sums, and nowhere is there any overt sign of his having made a lasting difference in the lives of others. For a man who "had it all" monetarily, through the eerie fog of this ghostly encounter, Scrooge saw with clarity, for the first time, how bereft he in fact was in life. Scrooge then asks the Ghost a "seeking" question, "Can you show me some tenderness... some depth of feeling?" Scrooge is accustomed to having, to possessing, and in his desperate situation, he seeks some demonstration of tenderness and depth. Give me something, he's basically pleading.

And as admirers of the story know, the ghost didn't disappoint... well, on second thought, he did in fact disappoint poor Scrooge. The ghost indeed showed our friend Scrooge true tenderness, and a wellspring of feeling, but to his dismay, these demonstrations had nothing to do with him. He could not lay claim to them. He could not bask in the glow of self-satisfaction as he was accustomed to in life, for the displays of genuineness he was permitted to witness were generated, ironically, by the Cratchit family. What the all-powerful Scrooge so longed for at that moment was on full display, in vivid color, by the family of his lowly subordinate whom he merely tolerated in his worldly quest for more. Thankfully, as all of us Scrooge fans know, he truly did see the light and the error of his ways, ultimately finding the true joy that comes from investing in people and relationships; that this type of income certainly cannot be counted in gold coins, but in the simple joy that resides in one's heart. Oh, I can't wait to watch it again this year!

Not unlike our friend Scrooge, we can all humanly struggle with the desire to accumulate; to want more; to unwittingly create counting houses of our own in this life. We don't have to be the infamous Dr. Spock to know that most toddlers' favorite word is "mine". Our human quest to possess starts early indeed. Possession is apparently nine tenths of the law, and the average toddler unknowingly lives by this philosophy, as do many of us in our adult years. It becomes increasingly easy, literally a

"no brainer", to continually seek after the things of this life. While we are created to seek after our God while making this earthly journey, it is so very easy to see how we can get sidetracked along the way; seeking the goodness of God, that deepening connection with our Creator and Sustainer in life, but settling instead for the trappings of this world that lack eternal value. Just the thought of this helps us to visualize how labored our journey can be with our God, as we become heavy


laden with the readily available, gravity bound offerings of this life.

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Matthew 6:25-26

What's the old saying about coming into this world with nothing, and eventually leaving the same way? What's the message here? It will never be the "things" of this world. How many hording cable shows must we watch? How many garages do we need to see that are too full to actually be used as intended, or closets, or pantries? The list goes on. Not unlike our forefathers and -mothers wandering in the wilderness with Moses as they awaited the Promised Land, some in this desperate lot fell prey to the temptation of even stockpiling the gift of manna so graciously delivered by God above, leaving them with only foul smells and maggots for their efforts. The temptation for surplus, for holding onto, has always been a human challenge; the vulnerability to envy, to want more, instead of simply allowing God to provide as only God can. Do we seek the things of this world, or that which pleases God?

I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me. Galatians 2:20

Many years ago, in the late 19th century, a missionary named A.W. Milne prepared to leave his life in Scotland to serve the tribal people in the New Hebrides in the South Pacific. Given that no missionary had ever survived mission life among the storied headhunters, Milne, instead of packing cargo trunks or suitcases for the journey, simply packed his few essentials in an empty coffin. For all he knew, this would be a one-way trip, yet he was ready. God may have given life to Milne, but Milne had chosen to return his life to God... in full. And the result? For 54 years, Milne served and lived among the tribal people, with his son William continuing on for an additional 13 years. While unsubstantiated, it is rumored that upon his death, Milne was buried in the center of the village, with his tombstone proclaiming, "When he came here there was no light. When he left there was no darkness".

Could Milne have known he would be of such great use to our Lord with the people of New Hebrides? Of course not. On the surface, it could have easily been a very long journey for a very quick death. But Milne was seeking to serve the Lord

with his life, and God certainly had a plan that Milne could not see. And what a difference he made for the Lord!

Show me your ways, Lord, teach me your paths. Psalm 25:4

So what are we seeking while we journey along our particular life path? Are we seeking the treasures that the world can offer us... money, prestige, notoriety, power, etc.? In other words, as believers while on the road that leads to our eternal home, is our attention being drawn to the many attractive exits that beckon us to veer from the path with Christ?

Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it. Matthew 7:13-14

Like Milne, we've each been given the gift of life... freely given. Yet it is up to each of us to give our lives back to the One who loves us the most, who wants to provide for us the best, who wants to complete a special work in us that only you and I can do. Is our light truly shining for God, or merely on ourselves, or possibly not at all? When we commit

our way before the Lord, we truly allow God to bless us as only He can, beyond anything we could imagine, even for the truly creative among us. Our all-mighty, all-powerful God cannot force us to give our lives back to Him. But if we willingly submit ourselves to Him, we can then, in faith, sing this beautiful Karen Lafferty hymn together...

Seek ye first the Kingdom of God And His righteousness And all these things Shall be added unto you Allelu Alleluia

... Amen!


this trip was to learn and understand the missionary spirit, evangelical zeal, radical hospitality and deep prayer lives of the Korean churches that have burst into flames of faith out of the dust of Korea's painful history of subjugation.

The protestant faith was brought to Korea in 1907 by Methodist and Presbyterian missionaries from the United States. The working of the Holy Spirit through the priority and practice of daily faith-filled prayer, confession, repentance and evangelism with testimonies of sacrifice and faith instead of fear, spread Christianity at an unbelievable rate through all of Korea. John 14 was the first scripture the missionaries were led to share as words of comfort and assurance of Jesus' presence now and in eternity. From those committed and dedicated servants of Christ, the hungry, hopeless and fearful people of Korea heard messages of hope, peace and love. This message was so different from the oppressive conditions under which the Koreans had been living for hundreds of years. These missionaries gave their lives so that Koreans might find true life and live in Christ. Hundreds of Koreans were baptized, became disciples of Christ and then led others to Christ and a life of faith, not fear.

We toured several Methodist and some Presbyterian churches in and around Seoul that have become centers of daily prayer, praise, peace, education, and provision of basic needs with radical hospitality for South Koreans as well as for pilgrims from all over the world. A part of their mission is to house, feed, teach and show pilgrims the results of things learned from the Missionaries long ago. Living lives of dedicated sacrifice, service and fervent prayer to displace fear is still the way of life for 80% of the people in South Korea. They told us that because missionaries came to rescue them from their hopelessness, fear and oppression, they now want to rescue other hurting, seeking and lost souls all over the world.

Specific disciplines of the mission of Korean Christian churches today, as modeled by the missionaries who came to Korea over 100 years ago are:

- to regularly, openly and specifically confess and repent;
- ♦ to train, send and support missionaries

- to other countries to teach and disciple others in the Christian life and service;
- to support seminaries and provide more training opportunities for seminarians;
- to provide continuous discipleship training of laity for leadership and selfless service for the good of the church and the community ("Good minister and good laity.");
- to participate in a small group (cell groups) for revival, accountability and support;
- to nurture the whole being of people by educating and training in faith, family and social life;
- to stress the importance of worship attendance and participation;
- to provide a meal with fellowship time after each service;
- to encourage and model Bible reading and study;
- to nurture new-comers by establishing and maintaining personal connections and use of their spiritual gifts;
- to support smaller churches with finances and leadership;
- to have openness and transparency of all church leaders;
- to give testimonies of faith and transformed hearts;
- to provide facilities, programs and support for people who are homeless or have different abilities;
- to partner with local business owners for services and training opportunities;
- to provide Christian education daily and weekly for people from infancy through adulthood;
- to stabilize and promote church growth by having a long-term plan for each church;
- to honor those faithful disciples who went before them.

However, the one discipline that guides and provides for all these aspects of mission in the churches is the faithful participation and dedication to corporate (with the whole congregation) worship and prayer in the sanctuary daily at 5 AM! This sounds unattainable, but it has been and still is happening! A Pastor leads this service with singing, a general prayer, a motivating message based on a passage of Scripture and then "tongsung kido" begins. That is the Korean method of praying. It begins when the Pastor and

congregation shout "Lord! Lord! Lord!" Then all the people start at the same time, out loud, praying, praising, talking, and crying out to the Lord. What a beautiful, bountiful, and busy sound of people talking to God! That must be what Pentecost sounded like!

At first this method of praying was overwhelming and intimidating, but soon I realized nobody but God could actually hear what I was praying because every person was in their own conversation with God! That was all that mattered! It was freeing to pour out and release to Jesus any and all emotions, thoughts, requests, confessions and burdens that were bottled in my heart and head! It was comforting and encouraging being with other believers who were connecting to God at the same time that I was! But nobody was listening to anybody except Jesus! Then came the time of being totally emptied and ready to listen! That beginning swell of emotion-filled conversations with God in the sanctuary eventually ebbed down slowly. It was only guided by the Holy Spirit, not a clock or a person. It was a quieter time when people were waiting, listening, being filled, led and calmed by The Holy Spirit. During this entire time of talking and listening, I discovered there was no lack of what to pray, what to say, what to praise, what to be thankful for, what to confess, what to repent, or what to release. Best of all, there was no lack of time for God to listen and then for me to listen! Time was lost. There was no time schedule for when you had to stop praying or listening and to leave the sanctuary. What a precious gift! What a precious way to start each day! For me it was not about the sleep I lost by getting up at 4:00 every morning, but it was about all I gained!

Getting back to the passion that John 17 evoked in me since my trip to Korea, I realized this passage explains the spark that ignited the flames of love and servanthood in the Koreans. Jesus prayed for protection and sanctification (setting apart from the world for God's purpose) for his disciples and those who come to faith through them, discipleship, unity of believers in and with Christ Jesus, understanding and continuation of Jesus' mission on earth and finally God's love for each person. This is what the missionaries showed and taught the

Koreans. This is what we saw practiced in the churches in South Korea today! That prayer is for all Christians today as well as those that went before us, just as Jesus stated. What a calling to live up to to have His full measure of joy, to go out and make disciples, to have unity among all believers with God through Jesus and his love so that the world may know God sent his Son, Jesus, to be our intercessor because He loves us!

How can we *not* live up to that? So how *can* we live up to that? That's what the Koreans showed us. They learned out of great necessity and desperate situations from caring missionaries. Today, Americans are much more comfortable than the Koreans were when they opened their hearts fully to Christ. So it may be much harder for us to learn!

Probably our biggest stumbling block to recognizing that we need unity with God and fellow believers through Jesus is the richness of living in this country. Many Americans, including myself, like to think of ourselves as self-sufficient and enjoy having the ability to get what we want, when we want it! Abundance of stores, methods of transportation and incomes make it easy to satisfy our wants and needs, so our souls seem fine! How easily we forget or don't see there are people with unmet needs and souls to be saved right in front of us. There is need for unity to be achieved here in this church, community and across our nation. There is need for love to be shared right here. We forget or just don't see those needs because of our own comfortableness or how far away from us those situations seem to be. The hundreds of years of suffering and fear made the Koreans hungry for God. Am I hungry for God? Am I filled with the full measure of God's Love? Am I living proof to someone else of God's loves for Jesus and therefore God's love for us? Am I reflecting Jesus' love for me and therefore unity with him and God, The Father? Those are the sparks of faith that got ignited into flames of faith in my heart while I was in Korea. Those flames of faith are being fanned now by the time I spend in prayer! Watch! The flames are spreading! Praise God!

The Koreans have learned to put their flames of faith into action, so there is no room or place for fear in their lives!

"...perfect love drives out all fear." (I John 4:18 NIV) Many times Jesus told his disciples and those he ministered to, "Fear not!", "Do not fear!", "Do not be afraid!", "Have faith in God... and do not doubt." Fear is the absence of faith. Faith will bring you through any circumstance and can enable you to "move mountains." This is the faith Koreans put into action and the flames of their faith are growing and glowing.

The rescued have become the rescuers! That truly is the role South Korean Christians feel called to and have sacrificially taken on for the good of the world! Really, though, that is every Christians' commission and mission from lesus Christ. He came and saved us! His Word tells us in Luke 10:37 from the NIV, "Go and do likewise." As written in Matthew 28:19-20 from the NIV Jesus tells His disciples just before ascending to Heaven "...go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

We heard Koreans' historical and heart wrenching personal stories of

- ...lives of Koreans' and missionaries at risk and some even given up in order to bring the knowledge of the saving Grace of Jesus to occupied Korea,
- ...terrifying escapes from North Korea before it was shut off, in order to be with family in South Korea,
- ...living in extreme poverty and fear through the destruction of their country during the Korean War (1950-1953).

However, those stories were quickly and faithfully followed by their faith-filled stories of

- ...personal sacrifices of pastors and believers made for the growth of the church,
- ...confession and repentance then reconciliation and blessings,
- ...huge belief that God is with them always and will provide,
- ...putting their faith into prayer and action, instead of fear
- ...the importance of serving and helping their neighbors and those less fortunate,

- ...ministering in small towns by holding worship services even if only one person comes for years and then seeing the congregation grow to thousands,
- ...embracing, igniting and empowering new members, children and youth,
- ...the never ending desire and commitment to serve Jesus, no matter how big or little the job might be, all done voluntarily out of love for Jesus (cleaning the bus at the end of the long day; cooking and serving meals after each worship service; cleaning Pilgrims' rooms and bathrooms each day and leaving treats for us; making the wine for Communion; cleaning and polishing all the wood, floors and pews in the sanctuary; driving the buses for the Pilgrims' and each Sunday to pick up people for worship; serving and cleaning the Coffee House; greeting and serving the Pilgrim Teams; teaching Sunday School and youth programs).



During this Pilgrimage, I was moved to improve not just the amount of time spent in prayer with Jesus, but the quality of content, sincerity, truth, and assurance of my relationship with God in Christ Jesus through prayer.

I am continuing to participate in the daily corporate worship and prayer, in Korean style, with other faithful souls. That takes place every morning at **5**AM at Camden Whatcoat UM Church. All are welcome! Will you join us? You have to experience it to believe it!

Join with fellow believers, wherever and whenever, in praying regularly and faithfully that the embers of our faith be fanned into flames of faith that will spread so that unity with God and other believers, through the power of the Holy Spirit, will transform the world selflessly and sacrificially. Then the world will know that God loves them!



Edging, Bricks, Benches & Beds!

The first order of Memorial Bricks with their requested inscriptions have been returned to the Church and placed on display on the Memorial Garden model in the Narthex. Upon the completion of the final approval by the folks who ordered these bricks a time of placement in the garden will be arranged. A second and third order are now in process and should be ready in a few days. Eight bricks have been inscribed with the letters 'A' through 'H' and have been placed in a clockwise pattern in the garden. These eight letters represent the eight portions of the brick bed and will be used as reference points in locating a specific brick in future years. In addition to the development and implementation of the Memorial Garden Brick Order Tracking System a protocol is now being established to record the actual location of each



The six Memorial Garden Benches have been placed on the Garden's concrete walkway in addition to the repositioning of a concrete bench at the beginning of the upper walk. Each side of the Garden's four sided pylon has had a sign affixed that reads 'In Memory Of'. We are now at the point of nearing the construction phase and eagerly awaiting the completion of the landscaped inner and outer rings.

As the final touches for the Memorial Garden are been prepared, plans are being finalized to complete the two south wall vegetative beds. In addition the front-of-building land-scaped beds will continue to be subjected to weed removal. A refurbished 'John Deere' professional edger will be used to test the effectiveness of a proposed walkway and curbing maintenance program. Dave Yencer, Trustee Chair, and the trustees as well as a number of other volunteers continue to

These are especially important for *all* volunteers who are new; however, we encourage "seasoned" volunteers to attend as well. There are some new requirements and changes in procedures. At a recent Code Purple training session at the Presbyterian Church, Reverend Lee emphasized that "It takes a village to pull this off... a large village!" Thank you to all who are stepping up to be part of our village of volunteers. I am sure God is pleased with our efforts!!



Fellow Parishioners,

In light of what has been in the news these past few months, specifically with churches around the world and here in this country, we are all concerned about our own Wyoming Church security. These are trying times with misguided souls lashing out at even God's house. We must face the reality that emergencies happen and be prepared for their eventuality. As some of you may be aware, the **Security Task Force** these past eighteen months has been working on developing proactive plans and procedures to improve security here at Wyoming Church. Our goal is to create an alert and aware environment that we as a congregation may be better prepared to react to an emergency.

Vulnerability assessments and inspections of our church have been done internally and through local first responders, identifying areas of improvement so that we can now build our security plans and capabilities to respond to these vulnerabilities. We have also trained staff and volunteers in our Lockdown Procedures to better protect our children - and adults - in the nursery, Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and Boys & Girls Club when confronted by a potential threat while they are in the church building. However, the job is not done





and more work is required by the Task Force - and YOU.

We are developing an Allinclusive Action Plan to address emergency situations and threats that our church may face, such as weather (hurricanes, tornadoes, etc.) and medical emergencies, fires, bomb threats and the one I fear the most - the "lone wolf" active shooter, the big scare around our nation after most recent events. The plan

is under development but it will take some time to complete.

Plans are good, however, they will not work if there are no volunteers to help make them work or put them to the test. Subsequently, we have developed special training for USHERS and GREETERS and ANYONE ELSE interested in how to recognize behavioral indicators of someone intending to do harm to our church and those worshiping there. Training will also focus on how to react to a potential threat.

Again, ANYONE interested in receiving this training is more than welcome! Training dates will be announced in the very near future.


Ushers and Greeters are our eyes and ears before, during and after worship. Folks - We are seriously understaffed!
