included preaching, music and the sacrament of Holy Communion in three different languages all followed by an international covered dish supper. It was a blessing to all who were in attendance and I trust that God was glorified in and through it all. Wyoming Church began its journey into multi-cultural ministries in 2014 not knowing where the path would lead but we held fast to our faith believing that God would direct our steps. We began with the end in mind. The dream of having multi-cultural worship was little more than a dream three years ago but we continued to trust the Lord for the outcomes. Beginning with ESL (English as a Second Language) classes in 2015 we have seen persons from around the globe at our church with a current enrollment of 35 students with a waiting list. 

Ask and it will be given to you... For everyone who asks receives... Matthew 7: 7-8

On the first day of class, as the teacher covers the rules and expectations for their time together, at some point in this foundations and framework speech, he or she will likely say something to the effect of ... " and if you don't understand something I've said or something you are working on, don't simply struggle on your own, but ask me. Remember, the only dumb question is what? That's right... the question that is not asked". How many times have we heard this encouragement from a teacher or instructor over the years? Yet we know that most questions the average student is pondering remain unspoken. And why is that? Why do we hold back from asking for what we need, for clarification, for direction, for an answer? While obstacles are likely numerous, it's safe to say that fear is the primary adversary in simply raising a hand.

It amazes me, time and time again, how difficult it can be for so many who ultimately come into the counseling office to... ask for help. It takes such great courage to seek help; the many who have labored and limped along in this life, for years and years in some cases, accustomed to carrying heavy emotional bags along the way, finally realizing that they simply need to set them down with the help of a counselor, or a pastor, or a dependable friend. To ask, on the surface, seems like such an easy task. But in reality, asking requires courage, belief in self, humility, and maybe most important of all, trust in the person we are asking.

Trust in our fellow man, especially in authority figures, is quite possibly at an all-time

low. The times of inherent trust in another person, especially someone in a role of authority or expertise, seems to be a thing of the past. This has been replaced with an increased sense of skepticism or cynicism, which ultimately fosters inflated self-reliance and notions of entitlement. As a people, we have more opportunity than ever before to circumvent the typical path one may travel when bearing a question that requires answering. Not only can we confer with others in a lateral fashion, like one student asking a class mate a question instead of the teacher, but we have an increasing menu of technological options that allow us to address questions or concerns on our own terms, in veritable comfort, in front of our laptop or with an incredibly smart phone in hand. There must be a Youtube tutorial available, or a pod cast to tune in to, or a Web MD link to browse, or a TED Talk to tap into, or so on and so forth. We can do it ourselves, right? Or as the tough guys say in the movies..."I've got this." Even the workplace over the previous few decades can attest to the fundamental shift between employees of today compared to just a generation ago. The concept of working hard to please the boss and trying to move up the proverbial ladder has morphed into the expectation that the lower rungs of the ladder really don't apply, but instead, " I think I really deserve that rung at least mid-way up, yeah that's right, the one with a window and a view."

I see this most poignantly when I work with pre-marriage couples on family backgrounds, and in particular, the young couples who grew up in homes divided by separation and/or divorce. Inherent trust in authority figures? Not usually. Trust in themselves? Typically, and sometimes too much so. Not to make this sound too psychological in nature, but when a young person is hurt, scared, or insecure because of an up and down upbringing, it is not uncommon for a protective selfcenteredness to surface, or on the opposite side, a noted anxiousness or "needy" presentation. It was psychologist John Bowlby who, with the help of Mary Ainsworth, developed the concept of Attachment Theory, which in essence stated that if a child is not afforded a secure upbringing in a consistent, loving, and structured environment, than a given child will become either more of an avoidant temperament or anxious. Using the image of a playground teeter totter, the secure attachment is in the middle area of the teeter totter, in relative balance, while the anxious are leaning to one side of the teeter totter, and avoidants to the other.

For the avoidant response, the more protected I am in self, the less vulnerable I feel to being hurt any further. The consequence.... many young adults who have never learned how to deal with adversity or challenges. Given so many have developed a survival, protect mode, afraid to be hurt again, they don't naturally open themselves emotionally to others, most notably in relationships, which obviously factors into our incredibly high "living together" phenomenon as an alternative to marriage. It is a rather simple philosophy, after all..." if I don't open myself up to another, like asking a question for instance, I really can't get hurt." In pre-marriage, we talk about allegiance, and the question of whether our allegiance is for ourselves or the fledgling marriage. In so many relationships today, allegiance is sadly still relegated to self. Life challenges and marital struggles are really hard to deal with if one partner is not fully engaged or connected... not able to ask for the help they need; in essence, choosing the disconnected tension that progressively builds rather than the fear of being hurt any further.

So is it only the people from secure, healthy homes that have the courage and capacity to ask for help or direction? While certainly an advantageous platform to build from, the true ability to "ask" for what we need in this life, and we as believers know, comes primarily from our trust and utter reliance on our God, our Creator and Sustainer in this transitory life. If we connect the dots of the various points highlighted in this article, it is easy to see how so many folks in our world today carry a distrust and skepticism of our loving God, *(continued on back cover)*



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Winter is Fast Approaching...

As the temperatures begin to cool down, our thoughts turn towards winter and **Code Purple.** Our church will once again serve as a safe sanctuary for **Code Purple** nights when the temperature reaches 32° and below.

This is a **HUGE** endeavor and we want to be ready when it happens. We will be housing homeless men again this year because it is the biggest need within our community. **Code Purple** shelters will open on December 1st or on the first night past that date when the temperatures drop to 32°.

We are partnering with 3 other churches to provide men's sanctuaries. WUMC's schedule is as follows:

Sunday, December 10th through Saturday, December 16th Sunday, January 28th through Saturday, February 3rd Sunday, February 25th through Saturday, March 3rd Wednesday, March 27th through Thursday, March 29th (if needed)

It is important to realize that if the temperatures do not go down to 32°, we will not be open. However, these are the weeks we have been assigned and will be ready to open if needed.

Whatcoat UMC in Camden will also partner with us to help with volunteers and to drive the Code Purple bus to bring guests to our church.

THE CROSS, THE BRICKS, AND THE GROUNDS!

Whether you have recently traveled on New Burton Road, Wyoming Mill Road, or the recently opened West Dover Bypass, you have undoubtedly noticed the prominent white cross that adorns the central pylon of the Memorial Garden located on the east side of the Church. Along with the placement of the cross, the border and memorial bricks, under the professional direction of Dave Yencer, have been placed in an eight section circle that surrounds the cross. Dave and Terry Higgins are eagerly awaiting Mike & Becky Marasco's Lawns Plus crews completion of the inner and outer ring landscaping projects. Plans are now being finalized for the completion of the two south wall landscaping beds; the larger bed will contain shrubs that have biblical connections while the smaller bed will contain herbs named in the Bible.

MEMORIAL DRICK ORDERS are now being received and processed. A Brick Order Tracking And Confirmation System has been established to insure that the memorial brick requested messages are correctly and accurately laser-burned into each brick. Upon placement of the accurately messaged bricks in the garden a permanent record of their exact location will be available in the Memorial Room which is located at the north end of the Narthex. Order forms for memorial bricks and cremains placement are to be found on the Memorial Garden Model display in the Narthex. If you feel so led to place an order for a memorial brick(s), please remember that you can select the location of where you wish the brick to be placed within the brick circle.

THE LAWIS AND LANDSCAPED BEDS and

plantings continue to be monitored and cared for by a core of dedicated volunteers. Our warming climate has blessed us with an extended growing season which in turn has kept the mowers busy. Within the next few days the few hardy, misplaced wildflowers, otherwise known as 'weeds', that are beginning to reappear in the recently mulched landscaping beds will be 'visited'. In addition, plans are readied for the edging and cleaning of the walk ways and curbing. Due to the presence of the local white tailed male (bucks) deer population, steel wire protective cages are being placed around the tree plantings that are located on the east side of the church. The deer are attracted to the nearby crops and the required, freshly mowed, thanks to lim Klecan, meadow that is located on the east side of the church between the lawn and the railroad embankment.

A WEMORIAL GARDEN CELEBRATION AND

DEDICITION EVENT has been tentatively planned for the latter part of November so 'stay tuned'.

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

At 5:45 AM Sunday, October 15th, 9 people^{****} loaded in 2 vehicles with their sleeping bags and work clothes for 7 days, left WUMC for a 13 hour journey to Red Bird Mission in Beverly, Kentucky. A journey bathed in faith and prayers was beginning. But it wasn't as hard a journey as the one the first people who traveled to Red Bird with faith and prayers had.

Today, Red Bird Mission is a Missionary Conference of the United Methodist Church, serving 6 counties in the hollers of southeastern Kentucky for 96 years. It started because in 1913 a few church women of the Evangelical Church in Illinois became aware of the needs of impoverished people in the "Southern Highlands." They began praying for mission work to start in southeastern Kentucky and established a "Faith Fund" believing "that in faith, money would flow into the fund and that God would show them where and how to use it."

Meanwhile, "God-Fearing people in the mountains of southeastern Kentucky

were praying that someone would "come over and help us. One woman would stop at a large rock as she crossed the mountain weekly to get her mail and pray that a Christian school would be built at Red Bird, an area named for the Red Bird River that runs through it. Other

women were praying that their children would have a chance to attend a school and Sunday School near their homes. A local couple prayed for a school for the youth, because they saw "intelligent boys doing nothing and receiving no training."

God answered those faithful prayers of people who didn't even know each other and lived miles apart. Connecting these people from two different parts of the country as only God can do, "the first workers from Illinois arrived in Beverly, Kentucky on July 1, 1921 to teach school and Sunday School, remove rocks to clear space to build schools and churches on donated land, prepare meals, minister to the sick, and as mountain missionaries, be all things to all people. Their trip over the mountains, across streams and hollers with pack mules and no bridges or roads was an entirely new experience for them. They arrived shaken and bruised but welcomed into the home of the couple who prayed for a school for the youth." Thus started the legacy of faith at Red Bird Mission in Beverly, Kentucky.

Now Red Bird Mission operates several centers in 6 counties around Beverly, providing elderly ministries, family ministries, women and children



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ministries, dental and medical clinics, nutrition counseling, community housing improvement (Work Camp), access to clean water, a food bank, a clothing closet, a Christmas gift room, and a Christian school housing Pre-K through 12th grade, for 250 residential, foreign and local students.

As Work Camp volunteers, we are housed in bunk houses perched on various levels on the side of a mountain. Two local women in the Work Camp kitchen prepare delicious meals in a small but efficient institutional kitchen. The Work Camp volunteers do the daily dining hall and kitchen cleanup on a rotating schedule. Devotions and prayer are held before each breakfast and dinner in the modest dining hall led by one of the volunteers. Lunches are packed and taken by the work teams to their work sites, which may be as much as 45 minutes away from the Mission Center. A typical workday is 8:30AM to 4PM. There are many nonconstruction jobs for volunteers who prefer to serve in any Community Outreach Ministries at Red Bird.

Each work group of volunteers is assigned a Crew Leader from Red Bird Mission who works with them, explaining and guiding the home improvement project or whatever ministry the team has decided to serve.

Cautiously following our Crew Leader, who is driving a Red Bird work van filled with tools and supplies for our home improvement job site, we catch glimpses of numerous homes along the way nestled in the curves of the stream and on the sides of mountains in need of major repairs. The winding, twisting, roller coaster roads leave little room for forgiveness for careless driving or large coal trucks! Faith in God's protection on the roads is absolutely necessary!

This year our task was to take down an old chimney, replace the floor and lower the ceiling in the room where the wood stove stood. This house was one of 5 homes in the family compound on the banks of a stream. The oldest home there was 225 years old where the grandfather was born. He now lives in a newer home there in the compound. Except for a time in

the Army, he has lived in this place all his life. The stories of his 88 years of life were endlessly fascinating! The family cemetery up the mountain is very revered and tells much about this family.

The house in this family compound selected for this project belongs to the son and his wife and 3 children, 13, 8 and almost 2. This house, built in the 1950's, had no electricity or codes at that time. Electricity has been added but still today, there are no codes! Safety for the family determined the priority of this job. The family was welcoming, shy at first, but warming up as we demonstrated our care and respect for them.

Conversations about their lives became easier and more personal. Building relationships with the people we are helping by servanthood, selfless love and respect is really the most important task of any mission trip.

By the end of the week, the tasks were completed. But more importantly, warm smiles, handshakes and thanks from the heart were exchanged. They have a safer place for their wood stove that heats their house in the winter. We have a new appreciation of the opportunity to be Christ's hands and feet in faith to strangers, who live 13 hours away in a place and a style very unfamiliar to us.

Thanks be to God for this legacy of faith!






