

Reflections Reflections

Doors. A and i will be given be good will ind: the door will be opened to you. Mathew 7:7

Like many avid readers, I tend to have a variety of books scattered about, yet one that I keep especially close at hand is a small, unremarkable looking little volume called The Book of Choices, written by Mike Magee, M.D. Dr. Magee highlights a series of "choices" we must make as we live out our lives, whether we are actually aware of this process or not. For example, the choice to love or hate, for hope or despair, for engagement or indifference, and so on. What makes this work so memorable is that Magee incorporates quotes from well-known figures across history and expertise to illuminate the choices we are faced with in our humanity. Reading this book over the years has heightened my appreciation for simple, yet profound words of wisdom about this life experience we each are privileged to enjoy.

While not from the aforementioned book, a favorite spiritual encouragement of mine I heard long ago, still makes me smile with its insightful simplicity. Given that I don't know the source of the encouragement, the exact wording may be a bit off, but the general message is, ...It is good to pray for God to move the mountain in my path, but it doesn't hurt to push. What a wonderful reminder of our very personal relationship with our God. What a challenge for us as well, to become an advocate for ourselves and our life path; that our journey in this life is with God, not God simply pulling us along.

In Matthew's Gospel text above, Jesus doesn't allude to a "mountain" we may encounter in life, but instead to a "door" that may impede our journey's progress, and most importantly of all, the encouragement to knock. The Bible, in general, is filled with memorable examples of doors being knocked, whether Bartimaeus knocking on the door of blindness, or the bleeding woman who knocked on the door of gender, or the Roman centurion who knocked on the door of citizenship. If we're listening closely as we sift through the stories of scripture, we can almost hear the light tap tap of faithful knuckles. One of the more entertaining knocking episodes in the Bible has to be that of the persistent widow, who was unrelenting as she knocked on the door of justice that was closed before her.

Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up. He said: "In a certain town there was a judge who neither feared God nor cared what people thought. And there was a widow in that town who kept coming to him with the plea, 'Grant me justice against my adversary.'

"For some time he refused. But finally he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or care what people think, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will see that she gets justice, so that she won't eventually come and attack me!" "Luke 18:1-5

What a woman! And what an example for us still today. Quite simply, a door

is a barrier, an impediment to movement, an obstacle to progress. More to the point for us in this article, "doors" separate us from fully connecting with our Lord while making our way in this life. The question for us today, as we prepare for the ceremonial turning of a new calendar year, is what door or doors may be impeding our connection with the God of our creation. Unlike the blind Bartimaeus for instance, who obviously didn't ask to be blind, many of our "doors" in life we have chosen to allow; in essence we have welcomed in the very barriers that restrict our relationship with God.

We must remember a vital truth in this life, the truth that God loves us with a perfect and complete love, and that because of this unimaginable love, He will not, and actually cannot, force us to remove the obstacles that we allow to obstruct our most important connection to Him. But hear the good news, as Matthew's Gospel clearly reminds us, that if we have the courage to "knock", choosing to challenge those doors that separate us from our God, He will open them for us; we will be made new; we will enjoy a new found freedom, all of which only our heavenly parent can offer. The prize of a deeper, more peacefilled relationship with God is at stake. The choice to knock on the doors of our separation is up to you and me.

Lord God, give us the courage to look honestly at our lives, in grace and with humility, and to knock on the doors that separate us from a closer walk with You. May we hunger for more of You in our lives, and may we realize anew that our relationship with you loving Father will be as complete and peace-filled as we allow it. Lord, may we want more of You in this life...

Amen.


In the Fanny Marvel Library for you



GOULASH SOUP

7 oz. onions

Cookbooks

1 garlic clove 2 large peppers (one red, one green)

3 medium tomatoes

10½ oz. lean stewing beef 3 Tbsp. vegetable fat 1¾ pt. beef stock

Fresh ground pepper Paprika ½ tsp. caraway seeds Marjoram, chopped Tabasco sauce

Salt

3 Tbsp. tomato puree

Peel and slice onions. Peel and finely chop the garlic. Cut the peppers in halves and remove the stalks, seeds, and white ribs. Wash and slice into fine strips. Place the tomatoes briefly in boiling water (do not cook them), rinse with cold water and remove the skins. Remove cores and cut tomatoes into quarters. Rinse the beel under cold running water and pat dry. Cut beef into small cubes. Melt the vegetable fat and brown the meat well all over. Add the stock and simmer for about 30 minutes. Add the vegetables and tomato puree and season with salt, pepper, paprika, caraway seeds, and marjoram. Simmer for about 15 minutes cooking time 45 minutes.

Every meal is an occasion for thanksgiving. So goes the daily motto of the Christian community. Christian families, in their act of saying "grace" before meals, symbolize this truth. Memorial Garden Brick Ørders



Another large order is nearing completion at the Stonecutter's Shop, while the most recent bundle of orders will be taken to the Shop the week of the 17th. The initial phase of the Memorial Garden Brick location and reference system that is



to be permanently housed in the Church's Memorial Room is nearing completion.

The Scripture based Herb Garden, located just outside of the East Kitchen Door, should be finished soon including the placement of winter-hardy plants. Plans continue to be refined for the transformation and completion of the scripture related shrub bed along the Church's south wall. The bricks used on the completion of these two raised beds are the same types that were used in the Memorial Garden construction. A Memorial Garden Dedication will be scheduled just as soon as the two contracted inner and outer landscaped rings are complete.






