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From the Pastors' Desk



The very first sermon I (PR) ever preached was at my home church in Middletown on Pentecost Sunday back in 2003. I had graduated from college back in January and I was preparing to pack up and move to Kentucky that fall to start seminary. On that Sunday I talked about how the disciples must have felt in Acts I. Jesus has just passed the baton of ministry and leadership for the future of the Christian movement on to them, and then he leaves them to return to heaven. In that moment they must have been scared - scared that they wouldn't be able to do what he asked, scared that they were going to let him down, and perhaps

even scared of what might happen if they were successful. They weren't scared for long though, because when the Holy Spirit comes upon them in Acts 2 everything changed. Where there had once been a ragtag group of uncertain and scared people, there now stood a band of committed, fearless leaders that were ready to do everything they could to glorify Christ.

I think all of us as Christians struggle with those same feelings and questions: God, am I doing what you ask of me? - God, did I let you down? - Jesus, I'm afraid. God asks a great deal of us, so



how can we be sure that we are up to the task of serving him? What made the difference for those first disciples is the same thing that makes all the difference for us: the Holy Spirit's power and presence in our hearts and lives. Apart from the Spirit we can do nothing. Lindsay and I can't deliver God's Word apart from the Spirit's influence and guidance. Our praise team and choir can't sing without the Spirit of God in their heart. Our Sunday school teachers can't minister to our children without the love of God and the Spirit's wisdom. We can't worship, study, or give glory to Jesus Christ if the Spirit isn't present.

Thanks be to God for the gift of the Spirit may we tap into the Spirit's power every day so that we can worship and serve the Lord with gladness in our hearts.

What is FER?

Family Emergency Relief

is a fund consisting of offerings contributed into a marked offering bucket at the back of the church (near the door on the way out), typically on the last Sunday of the month. You may also put your FER contribution in your regular offering envelope by marking FER on the "other" line.

What are these funds used for?

People who are in desperate need call and stop at our church. Recent requests have come from a mother whose electricity was shut off. She needed help so that her 5-year-old daughter could return to live with her in their apartment, and not be evicted altogether. Another need was for a late gas bill. This young mother had

broken her leg, couldn't work, and had to pay for her father's funeral expenses. She was going to return to work within the week.

We mainly help working, struggling families who get into trouble with bills when they have an emergency.

Most recently, we also helped a retired man get orthopedic shoes. This man is living in his son's out-building and despite severe pain in his feet helping his son with construction work so the young family of 8 can eat.

Every incoming request goes through a background check at the State Service Center, where we also verify that the client does not qualify for state assistance.

Each bill we pay is paid directly to the creditor. We help no more than once a

year, but seldom are asked for more.

By contributing to this fund, you are helping our church to "love our neighbors as ourselves!"

The inspiration for Father's Day was Mother's Day. So if you are asked, which came first, Mothers Day or Fathers Day...it's Mothers Day! Women came before men on this one.

Sonora Smart Dodd (Spokane, Washington) was listening to a Mother's Day sermon in her church and thought silently to herself that fathers needed the same sort of recognition also.

Sonora's own mother died in 1898. She was one of six children. Her father raised his children alone after his wife's death. She felt that her father definitely deserved some recognition. She began working through Protestant churches and local groups in the Spokane area to promote this holiday. She decided that the 3rd Sunday in June would be the day, and instead of a carnation (like Anna Jarvis proclaimed for Mother's Day) Sonora said everyone should wear a rose for Father's Day. She circulated a petition at first among ministers and church organizations. So, the very first Father's Day observance took place in churches and were similar to the Mother's Day celebration.

The church's also used Father's Day as a way to promote the masculine side of Christianity and to remind men (who might become fathers) and all fathers of their obligation to look after their families' spiritual welfare also.

Sonora Dodd then formed a committee to promote the new church celebration by getting political endorsements, answering questions from around the country and putting on local celebrations. Although she did a lot of work, the idea of a Father's Day did not catch on as quickly as a Mother's Day did.

By 1920, Father's Day had pretty well

evaporated from the American social calendar and Mrs. Dodd had moved on to other interests. But after studying at the Art Institute of Chicago and working as a fashion designer in Hollywood, she came home to Spokane 10 in the 1930's. At that time, she resumed her campaign for a Father's Day. By this time, the holiday (celebrated only in churches) was 25 years old. Suddenly, there was a renewed interest and Father's Day got a little boost (at least in Eastern Washington State). But, the rest of the United States wasn't so enthused and took it as just another excuse for a holiday, especially when it came to the commercial issues. After all, what did men want with sentimental things like flowers, gifts and greeting cards?

But guess who came charging to the rescue? The Associated Men's Wear Retailers of New York City took on the challenge of getting a Father's Day in this country (not out of the goodness of their hearts, more like their pocketbooks. They knew the commercial potential!) In 1938, they set up The National Council for the Promotion of Father's Day. The council worked with florists, tobacconists, stationers and men's clothiers across the United States to promote Father's Day. Their slogan? "Give Dad Something To Wear!"

President Calvin Coolidge had originally recommended that Father's Day become an official observance in 1924. But it took years... I mean - YEARS until 1972 when President Richard Nixon signed a proclamation proclaiming the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.

Unfortunately, Sonora Smart Dodd died in 1978 at the age of 96, and only lived to see her holiday celebrated for a few years. Today, the Father's Day Council estimates that this observance brings in approximately \$1 billion a year in retail sales.

Fathens Day Symbols

The Tie!

Ironically, Christmas wasn't the holiday that traditionally had you giving dad a tie. No, what Mother's Day did for the florist industry, Father's Day did for men's wear and ties. Along with tobacco items, shirts or anything that was masculine that dad would like (fishing, hunting, you name it!) the commercial retailers just jumped on the bandwagon to turn this holiday into a monetary success.

Knowing that many considered Father's Day gifts as a joke (Real men don't want gifts they said!), a new type of gift-giving industry emerged: Gag Gifts.

Suddenly ads were appearing surrounding fathers with cheesy, tacky, silly, ridiculous gifts and then suggested getting Dad the traditional classic tie or socks. Although these commercial ploys were obvious, well, hey... soon Dads were well expecting "something" for Father's Day or they felt unappreciated or unloved.

As early as 1920, the custom of giving ties to fathers as a symbolic gesture of love was a joke. A man was often teased for his "ugly tie" that his wife got him, as it was common for her to have no sense of taste. And poor dad was left wearing an ugly tie in order not to hurt his wife's feelings.

But the idea of giving men flowers was even more ridiculous back then. At least ties, socks, pipes, etc. were more masculine. Although today, dads everywhere get all sorts of gifts from plants for their office, a dozen brownies to indulge in, or tickets to their favorite game, it still remains today that "the tie" is the traditional and classic Father's Day gift.

The Rose: Sonora Smart Dodd suggested the rose in her petition to establish a holiday. She felt that a white rose should be worn for a father who died, and a red rose for a father who was still living. Even though it took over 60 years for Father's Day to become an official holiday, the idea of the rose as its symbol to wear on this day was never challenged. It was, however joked that the real flower for Father's

> Day should be the dandelion. Why? Because like a father, "the more it is trampled on, the more it grows."

Growing Season

Jesus replied, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God." Luke 9:62

Maybe it's because I grew up on a farm, but there's an excitement that stirs within me when the tractors reappear in the springtime; as they begin to turn over the sleepy fields, and the birds descend in droves to scour the soil for edible treasures, and the farmers begin to plant their crops for yet another growing season. All of these steps and symbolic events are leading to something, they are going somewhere; if all goes well, toward a harvest at some point in the summer or fall. What exactly happens... time will tell. It's like my favorite farming quote... There is no better definition of faith then a man planting seeds in a field.

So the moral of the story is, quite simply, full steam ahead. I apologize for all the cliche's... it's just so hard to bypass such low hanging fruit! Sorry ... no more! The true purpose of this article is to highlight two essential principles of our spiritual journey that are inextricably linked, and which are captured so well in the practice of farming. The first is that we are to invest our all in what lies ahead, even though we can't see what outcome awaits us. Theologian Oswald Chambers wrote, "The spiritual life is the life of a child. We are not uncertain of God, just uncertain of what He is going to do next... when we have the right relationship with God, life is full of spontaneous, joyful uncertainty and expectancy." Secondly, as Jesus pointed out in Luke's Gospel, I can't plow ahead, so to speak, if I'm looking behind me. In essence, I'm not available to God with my life, both present and in the future, if my attention is lost in the past. I can only speak for myself, but it's a scary picture when I am driving and I happen to look over my shoulder to what's behind me. I invariably swerve in my lane, unintentionally becoming a hazard to both self and others. Our path is what lies ahead, not behind.

"Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. ¹⁹ See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I

am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland. Isaiah 43:18-19

Recently during a remote counseling session with a couple, the conversation drifted back to the challenging path the couple had endured for most of their married life, contrasting greatly with the stability and harmony they have enjoyed in recent months, the dividends of their hard work. In talking about where they are today compared to yesterday, and their hopes for the future, the wife excused herself from the meeting and hurried out of the room toward their kitchen. Upon her return, she held a wooden block in her hand with a quote etched on its surface. The quote, from

"The spiritual life is the life of a child. We are not uncertain of God, just uncertain of what He is going to do next... when we have the right relationship with God, life is full of spontaneous, joyful uncertainty and expectancy."

C.S. Lewis, read, "You can't go back and change the beginning but you can start where you are and change the ending." The wise words of Lewis have continued to turn over in my mind; such simple truth; so free we are intended to be when we journey with our Lord.

A client many years ago would use a particular phrase every so often in session, leading me to believe that it must have been her personal manta; her response to the temptation to get weighed down with the cares of this world. When speaking of heavy topics, especially those in the past, she would conclude such reflections with the phrase, "You gotta just keep it moving." "It", of course, meaning our life, our journey with the Lord.

Like breadcrumbs on the forest floor, the lessons continue to surface as I think back to a wonderful military couple that impacted our family in so many positive ways, one being, interestingly enough, in how we look at packing. Having moved often in the course of their career, this couple were experts in the art of packing, especially the wife, who was typically in charge of the process. She would say, "There's only so much room in the moving van. You can't take unnecessary stuff from one place to another. If there is a box still in our possession, unopened from our last move, it's not making the trip. It obviously isn't important to our daily life now. We always leave boxes behind." Her philosophy reminds me of Jesus' words to his disciples as he sent them out to spread the Good News. He instructed them to take the bare minimum; that their needs would be provided for along the way, and so, in essence, to... keep it moving.

Our relationship with God is just that, a relationship designed to be in motion. To where we might ask? Well, as we can see in this article, and how the farmer lives out season after season, the destination, the harvest, so to speak, is unknown. As the Word reminds us, God is in charge of the harvest, and the same is true, of course, when it comes to where our lives ultimately go. This is God's portion of our relationship with Him; we may be uncertain of the future, but certain of God. And so we leave unnecessary boxes of the past behind us, keeping only the essentials with us in the immediate, and we set forth, traveling light, on our life journey with our God, our Creator, and our closest friend. Our lives are intended to be a perpetual growing season.

May we each embrace the opportunity offered us to journey with the Lord, wherever He may lead... Amen



I - Around the world an estimated 47 million people around the world are living with Alzheimer's and other dementias, and if a change doesn't come by 2030, this number will grow to 76 million.

2 - Each second counts - a person develops Alzheimer's disease in the United States every 65 seconds.

3 - Caregivers in America - more than 16 million people take care of family or friends with Alzheimer's or dementia, and that, without pay.

4 - A leading disease - in the U.S., Alzheimer's is the sixth leading cause of death and 6.2 million of those living with Alzheimer's disease are over 65.

5 - One out of three deaths - Alzheimer's or other dementia kills one in three seniors and deaths due to this disease are more than prostate cancer and breast cancer combined.
