#### "The Hiding Place" by Corrie ten Boom

A story that proves that the light of God's love can penetrate even the darkest recesses of despair, places like the Nazi extermination camp at Ravensbruck. After protecting Dutch Jews in a secret room in their home, Corrie ten Boom, her sister and father were discovered, arrested, and imprisoned. Only Corrie survived, but her faith in God remained strong---so strong that, after the war, she could forgive a former camp guard in a face-to-face meeting. More than just a spellbinding adventure, The Hiding Place is a life-changing story.

#### Cornelia "Corrie" ten Boom

(15 April 1892 – 15 April 1983) was a Dutch Christian who, along with her father and other family members, helped many Jews escape the Nazi Holocaust during World War II. She was imprisoned for her actions. Her most famous book, The Hiding Place, describes the ordeal.

#### Partners in Ministry: Making Disciples for Jesus Christ - Part 2

Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always to the end of the age. Matthew 28:19-20

This will be my last article as lay leader as of the end of December I am stepping down from the position. For this final article, I am going to share some thoughts of mine concerning the state of the church.

As I shared previously, the church's youth council had come up with the acronym GRACE to describe our mission and vision as a youth ministry. G stood for Growth, which by that we meant that through study we would strive to grow in our knowledge, understanding, and relationship with God and his only son Jesus Christ. R was for Reach, which was how we could draw others into relationship with our Lord. A was Aid, where the focus was on how we could serve others. C stood for Community and the social aspect of the youth ministry. E is for Exalt, think worship. As consistent with the responsibilities of the lay leader, and with the blessings of the Executive Team, I thought it would be good to take GRACE and use it to help us take a look at the ministries within our church.

Over the last two years in the Executive Team, we took a look at the areas of Growth and Community. Concerning growth, we acknowledged that there are ample opportunities offered at Wyoming Church to indeed grow in our faith, whether through Sunday school, VBS, youth group, or small groups. Concerning Community, this church has been there to offer support to others in times of need and pain. We also offer many church events and small group gatherings that bring us together in fellowship and fun.

That leaves three areas I haven't touched on, Aid, Exalt, and Reach. I want to offer a quick look at two of those areas, Aid and Exalt. I believe Aid, under the leadership of the Outreach Team and through the caring and generosity of our congregation, is a strength of our church. As far as Exalt (worship), we have talented musicians and engaging preaching.

So that leaves us with Reach (think evangelism). How are we doing as far as drawing people to Christ as indeed we are called to do in the Great Commission (the verses at the top of this article). By and large, churches in America, <u>with exceptions</u>, are losing members and dropping in attendance. On the bright side, it is my understanding that the churches in Asia and Africa are expanding in followers.

What about our church? With the Covid epidemic we experienced, as did most churches, a drop in attendance after worship services and other activities resumed. Since then our



average attendance has increased each year, which is something that many churches cannot say. However, we are still about one hundred less in worship on the average Sunday than where we were pre-Covid. Those increased numbers are largely made up of people who have returned to us as the Covid epidemic has waned or came to us from other churches due to relocation or concerns with the church they were at. That growth is good, but I am seeing little or no growth from the unchurched population of our community.

Still another concerning note is the loss of young people as our congregations age. The last youth conference I attended (in 2016) offered this statistic. 50% of the active youth in your church will no longer attend once they finish college. On the bright side, 50% of those no longer attending will return once they have children. Overall, that means that churches are losing 25% of each young adult class. Have you seen this in your families? In my own family, two of my children are actively involved in the life of a church, including one who is a pastor down in a UM church in Georgetown. My other child attends worship or a function at a church occasionally, but not very often. With two young children, I hope she will become regularly involved with a church. Then there is my connection with young adults who went through the youth group at our church. Sad to say, some are no longer involved in a church or attend sporadically. I can't say for sure, but I suspect that number runs close to the 50% I cited earlier.

So how do we reverse this trend? How do we pull in the unchurched? One way, of course, is for all of us to be open to inviting friends, neighbors, and coworkers to join us here at Wyoming. Another is to hold events and have ministries at the church that draw the community in. Our VBS is one such event where I see kids attend who are outside our church family and are sometimes unchurched. Another way is for the church to get involved in events and ministries that put us out in the community. In the Gospels and Acts, Jesus, his disciples, Paul, Silas, and Barnabas did most of their ministry out in the communities, not inside the places of worship. Should we be looking at their example? How would you suggest we reach the unchurched in our community?

As I stated at the beginning of this article, I am stepping down as lay leader. As last words, I encourage those still in leadership positions and those coming into such positions to work on connecting our congregation with the community by taking God's love into it and making disciples.

#### The Flower Bed

The Lord makes secure the footsteps of the person who delights in him. Even if that person trips, he won't fall. The Lord's hand takes good care of him. Psalm 37:23-24

I had the opportunity recently to learn about a part of WWI that I was totally unaware of... the battles of Isonzo. The battles, 12 in total, were essentially fought to control a vital passageway within the Julian Alps, a mountainous range located on the western edge of Slovenia. This section of the Alps, not as steep as their more well-known neighbors in nearby Italy and Austria, gradually descends into a vast, fertile valley with an easily accessible river that lazily meanders its way to the open waters of the Adriatic. Definitely a prime spot of Alpine real estate. And as international hostilities escalated and territorial positioning became increasingly important during the early days of the war, this formerly quiet and pastoral setting became a literal war zone.

One interesting fact that I discovered in reviewing this regrettable chapter in history, was that due to the incredible amount of snow and numbingly cold temperatures during the winter, fighting was put on hold for a period of months, only to resume when the snow melted away and the freezing cold relented. Sadly, it was the return of warmer weather and better footing that signaled the right conditions for combat to continue.

Unlike a true war zone experience, this episode in military history came to mind recently as I made my last loop around our house, waging one last battle, so to speak, with the relentless weeds that also refer to our home as "home". I'm not a professional gardener by any means, but it seems like I make this particular tour at least 4 to 5 times a year, beginning in March, and concluding in my current October/November circuit. And then begins a cooling off period, literally. The temperatures get colder, the ground freezes up, and the weeds return to... wherever weeds return to! There is a quiet that pervades the flower bed. And

> as spring eventually returns next year, my work will begin... pruning shrubs, digging out dead plants, planting new additions, and the list goes on. And the weeds? They don't require any attention or maintenance whatsoever. They are ready for action. They simply wait for the right conditions to make their return appearance. Bothersome? Without a doubt. But consistent and predictable? Yes.

It was C.S. Lewis, during the tumult of World War II in 1941, who wrote a series of "letters" for the Anglican newspaper, The Guardian, which were latter assembled into a book more widely recognized as, The Screwtape Letters. Utilizing the concept of letters exchanged between a senior level demon, Uncle Screwtape, and Wormwood, his novice demon nephew, both of whom work together to derail the "patient" on earth from following the path of faith, Lewis sought to illustrate the spiritual battle we combat against temptation, which subtly seeks to bind us more fully to this fallen world, while consequently turning our attention and hearts away from the Lord and the path which leads us toward our heavenly home. Not unlike the weeds in the flower bed that may relent at times, yet never fully fade away, Lewis depicted temptations in a similar fashion. Whether it's the temptations that flourish in this fallen world or the pesky weeds in my garden, both will be here for the duration. And like weeds, temptations merely live in the soil, so to speak, of our lives. We are all vulnerable, each and every one of us, for all time. Not a pleasant thought, I know, but it is the truth. Maybe this is why Jesus, in the Lord's Prayer, prayed specifically for God to... lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. As we know, even Jesus was not immune from temptation's pursuit.

This journey of life is like, in many ways, a road trip, one that travels through pretty and quaint farm settings, but which also ventures through its share of dark streets in the tough part of town. And it's not just the tough streets we need to be weary of traveling, because the evil one can reach us just as easily along that idyllic



looking farm road, so to speak.... maybe even easier. It is important for us to remember that we cannot separate temptation out of this life experience, but we can, thankfully, separate ourselves, with God's help, away from temptation. Jesus encouraged us in Scripture to.... be in the world, but not of the world. And when His disciples were growing weary and disheartened in their ministry travels, as captured in John's Gospel, Jesus encouraged His friends by declaring, "But take heart! I have overcome the world."

God is great. God is Almighty. Yet we must also do our part, in union with God, to live in the freedom and peace that God offers us from the trappings of this world. And so, what exactly is doing our part when it comes to temptations? For starters, if we are ready to be honest with ourselves, and with God, we will take a sincere inventory of our lives, truly acknowledging what temptations we are vulnerable to. Some temptations are the "tough part of town" variety, easily recognizable adversaries like jealousy, being judgmental, pride, and selfcenteredness, to name just a few. Some temptations, however, are the "farm road" variety, which on the surface, might appear as "good" things. Eating nourishes our body. Money allows us to purchase necessities, save for our future, and assist others. Sexual intimacy is the loving tie that both solidifies a marriage and creates a family. Work is a means of earning an income and supporting one's self and others financially. The list goes on and on... the "good" things of this life, which if allowed to become excessive, typically due to unaddressed emotional wounds from the past, are then "lived out" in a distorted or skewed fashion. This mode of living, or more accurately, this mode of existing, takes a person further afield in life, increasingly apart from a place of balance or moderation which is required for healthy growth, maturity, and sound relationships.

I think I can speak for the bulk of us in saying that we would like to be free from

temptation's hold while on this life journey. We would also like to be healed and renewed from the hurts we've experienced along the way, and as believers, we know that only lesus can give us this, but we must allow Him. Jesus loves us too much to simply barge into our lives and take over. Jesus will not force us to receive what He willingly offers. We must love ourselves enough to sincerely invite Him in, allowing the Lord to truly be the savior He came to be for you and me. We may have to live in this world, but only Jesus can smooth out the path we walk, protect us from carelessly hurting ourselves along the way, and fill in the empty spots within us; applying the healing balm we need for our wounds to fully heal, not leaving us so vulnerable to the evil one who loves to exploit our hurts, our brokenness, and our emptiness.

The pathway of life will always have its challenges, in particular the potholes of temptation scattered along the way, but there is truly nothing this world can throw at us that can derail our progress when we walk hand in hand with our best friend and savior. Let His strength and love protect us in our travels, for as the Apostle Paul proclaimed in Romans 8.... <sup>38</sup> And 1 am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow - not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love. <sup>39</sup> No power in the sky above or in the earth below indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord... Amen

The Hobo David Van Kavelaar



Today, my dog Storm and I arrived at the church's south field just in time for the tenminute carillon presentation that washed over us on this sunny November day. As usual, we were doing our daily ritual of playing ball and just lazing beneath the oak tree as its leaves were now transitioning to a brilliant orange and its acorns have fallen onto the green grass beneath the tree's drip line. Just then, a freight train chugged its way north and slowly passed our location. I marveled at the exquisite graffiti seen on the rail cars and allowed my mind to conjure up some memories of my past involving railroads. The whispering wind was coaxing the rustling leaves to make their final descent to the grass below and the rumbling freight train just one hundred feet away provided the visual and audio background for my recollections. Yeah, there was a time...

Growing up in Edgemoor Gardens just north of Wilmington, my buds and I were mystifyingly drawn to the railroad tracks that paralleled the Delaware River and the Shanty Town below our community. This was before the construction of I-495. I'm uncertain as to what the magnetic attraction to a railroad yard was to a bunch of thirteen-year old boys: nothing but dust and the intoxicating smell of diesel fuel and creosote. I wanted to talk to a hobo in the worst way because of my similar infliction of wanderlust. I had this thing about going outside of established boundaries placed upon me by my parents. My mom told me of a time when I was around eighteen months old. I was tethered to a leash device that could allow me twenty feet or so of movement along the length of the clothes line my leash was attached to. Somehow I had freed myself of the "hindering leash" and toddled up to the projects. My mom came up to retrieve her wayward son after Butchie, some teen-aged kid from the projects, had dug into his jean pockets and came up with two pennies, a little ball of string, a couple paper clips, a pack of matches,

a bottle cap, and... ah yes, a safety pin to secure my sagging diaper (mom's recollection).

The local train that ran from Wilmington to Philadelphia and beyond would stop at the Edgemoor Train Station. Brother Bob and I would walk to the station on Friday evenings to meet dad who worked in PA. It was a thirty-minute walk to help dad up the hill (dad had asthma) to our house. I told dad of my wanting to talk to a hobo; he strongly discouraged it. On some of our boyhood excursions along the railroad tracks in marshy areas, we'd come across a small pile of fire ashes where some hobo had eaten his meal. "Wow! Let's eat here." We had a pack of hot dogs so Bob. Charlie. Billy and I had two each. We scrounged around for some kindling and, after getting a nice little blaze going, we heated up water for tea (of course we had our boy scout canteens and cups) and grilled our franks to perfection. It was a nice chow down, but our primary goal was to trod where few have dared to go; a cool and invigorating experience awaited. We went further into the Cherry Island Marsh area to investigate, had no idea what to expect, but onward we went. How's it expressed in Star Trek, "...where no man has gone before."

But why can't we find a hobo guy to talk to? Merle Haggard expresses the sentiment of a hobo as he requests the Lord to give him one more train to ride in the song "Where Have All the Hoboes Gone?"

The silver rails have lost their shine, they're just a victim of our time. They might as well rust in the rain, what good's a track without a train? I'd love to hear a whistle whine and ride a box car one more time So, Lord, if you're still on my side you'll send me one more train to ride.

Let's focus in on the hoboes and see how they "evolved" over time but first, in case you weren't aware, there is a societal "pecking order" among the unfortunate hoboes, tramps, and bums. Tramps and hoboes are commonly lumped together, but in their own view, they are sharply different. A hobo is simply a migrant laborer; he may take some longish holidays, but sooner or later he returns to work. A tramp never works if it can be avoided, he simply travels. Lower than either is the bum who neither works or travels, except when impelled to motion by the police.

Some history now. With the end of the American Civil War in the 1860's, many discharged veterans returning home began hopping freight cars. Others looking for work on the American Frontier followed the railways west aboard freight trains in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. The number of hoboes increased greatly during the Great Depression Era of the 1930's. With no work and no prospects at home, many decided to travel for free by freight train and try their luck elsewhere.

Around the end of WW II, railroads began the move from steam to diesel locomotives making jumping freights much more difficult. This, in combination with postwar prosperity, led to a decline in the number of hoboes.

In the 1970's and 1980's, hobo numbers were augmented by returning veterans many of whom were disillusioned with settled society. Overall, the national economic demand for a mobile service labor force has declined over time leading to fewer hoboes.

Life as a hobo was dangerous. In addition to the problem of being itinerant, poor, and far from home and support, plus the hostility of many railroad yard crews, they faced the railroad police, nicknamed "bulls", who had a reputation of violence against trespassers.

Well anyway... back to reality. I've come to realize a thirteen-year old boy in 1960 only saw the excitement and romanticism tied to the notion of riding the rails to who knows where. But now, the urge to attempt such an undertaking has dissipated with time and, after abandoning the Hobo Dave dream, I still enjoy the many train songs that have been around for a long time, you know, King of the Road, Chattanooga Choo Choo, Wreck of the Number 9, Mystery Train, The Orange Blossom Special, Rock Island Line, all of Boxcar Willie's stuff, and much more.

Here's a little thought from John Prine's "The Hobo Song":

Please tell me where have all the hoboes gone to, I see no fire burning down by the rusty railroad track. Could it be that life has gone and left them all tied up in life's eternal traveling sack?

So as Storm yawned and traipsed southward to "reclaim" the other oak tree on the church campus, my fond remembrances of our gang's "railroad escapades" slowly ebbed away with the fading clickety-clack of the north-bound freight train. But boy, were those days fun!

Celebrate with a soup a day to keep the chill away. Enjoy your favorite soup with friends and family...and don't forget to share your best recipes!

**Soup is...** a flavorful and nutritious liquid food served at the beginning of a meal or a snack. Traditionally in France, soupé was a slice of bread on which the contents of a cooking pot (potage) was poured. Soup was designated as unstrained vegetable meat or fish soups garnished with bread, pasta, or rice.

However, it is the good stock which gives the body or strength to the soup. After an appetizer, soup is the first meal in real sense. Soups have many forms...some soups are thin and served as broths, while some are served as clear soups such as consommé.

#### I. Chicken Noodle Soup

#### Chicken Noodle Soup... ...from scratch.

#### Ingredients:

- 1/2 Tablespoon butter
- 2 ribs celery , diced
- 3-4 large carrots diced
- 1 clove garlic , minced
- 10 cups chicken stock , or broth
- 1 teaspoon salt, to taste
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon freshly ground black pepper , to taste
- 1/8 teaspoon dried rosemary, or more, to taste
- 1/8 teaspoon dried sage
- 1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 5 cups dry egg noodles, farfalle or other bite-size pasta
- 3 cups rotisserie chicken
- 1 teaspoon better than bouillon chicken flavor, (or more, as needed), or chicken bouillon granules

#### **Instructions:**

Add butter, diced celery and carrots to a large stock pot over medium-high heat. Sauté for 3 minutes. Add garlic and cook for another 30 seconds.

Add chicken stock and season the broth with rosemary, sage, crushed red pepper, and salt (definitely TASTE the broth before adding more salt), and pepper. Taste and add a spoonful of "better than bullion" chicken or chicken bouillon cubes or granules as needed.

Bring broth to a boil. Add noodles (either uncooked homemade egg noodles, or dry store-bought pasta) and cook just until noodles are al dente.

If using store-bought noodles, be cautious not to overcook them! Remove pot from heat as soon as they are just barely tender. The noodles will continue to cook once you remove the pot from the heat, and you don't want them mushy.

Add chicken meat from the rotisserie chicken. Taste the broth again and add more seasonings, if needed.

Store leftovers in an airtight container in the refrigerator for 4-5 days, depending on the freshness of the chicken you used.
