

Please convey our appreciation to the thoughtful people of your church who donated a tremendous amount of food to our Pantry all this year.

Thanks to your generosity for this entire last Calendar Year through the end of December we were able to provide food to each of the 1165 Families, (2665 Adults and 2866 children) who came to our pantry for food assistance. Thanks to the varied kinds of food your people donated, we were able to provide a very wide variety of foods to each family. The above numbers also included an Easter Basket, a Thanksgiving Basket and a Christmas Basket for a complete traditional dinner in addition to our normal food assistance.

Our Thanksgiving dinner provided a Thanksgiving Turkey and the accompanying traditional foods to 146 families, 975 total people (387 Adults, 588 Children).

Our Christmas dinner provided a Christmas Turkey or Ham and the accompanying traditional foods to 133 families, 785 total people (336 Adults, 449 Children).

Thanks to the generosity of the Wyoming Methodist people we were able to give a considerable amount of families two weeks of food that we would not normally be able to do with the foods our people would normally be able to donate.

Many hands in our congregation and beyond create much appreciated gifts!



# Blessings in our Community

Our congregation has been amazing in sharing God's love to our community in 2023!

We have contributed \$35,000 to many projects including Lifetime Wells International, UMCOR, Interfaith Alliance food bank, Habitat, Rise Against Hunger, community meals at Wesley UMC, among many distributions.

Through FER contributions, we shared funds with the Interfaith Alliance as well as individual needs. \$12,000 was given to help individuals with rent assistance, utilities, a heater repair, etc. The recipients of these funds were all working families who had a crisis which kept them from being able to handle their bills for a brief time.

In addition, we furnished flood/ cleaning buckets, personal care items, nonperishable lunches, school supplies, coats for school children, Christmas gifts, and baby products for families in Dover.

The regular church budget line was used to support 3 United Methodist missionaries.

You have been caring to our community and world. We look forward to another busy 2024! All this was accomplished through Christ. Who could have imagined we would do so much?

### Clothing and Household Items

The Outreach Team recommends that you donate USABLE clothing and shoes to the Wesley UMC Clothing Closet. They also gratefully accept useful household and kitchen items such as sheets, towels, pans, etc. Decorative items are not encouraged. It is at the end of North Street across from the Biggs Museum parking lot. What is different about this effort is that they give items away free to those who are referred by another church (we have sent people there). On Saturdays, their thrift store is open to community members, with prices ranging from \$1 to \$3. And the proceeds are given to our local community, as well.

We recommend that you give usable furniture, lighting, fixtures, etc. to the Habitat Restore. These items will be resold to the community, and proceeds are used to fund local Habitat homes. Pick-up for large items can be arranged.

# RECYCLE Used & Un-sellable Clothing

If you have clothing, linens, shoes, or curtains that are torn, worn, or very out of date, please, deposit those items in the bins found in many parking lots in the area (e.g. one near Aldi in Camden). We are told that these donations are often recycled, which means they will not go into the landfill!

### Ho Ho Ho!!!

In December of 2023, WUMC brought back "The Giving Tree" after using the Amazon Wish List during Covid times. Tags were hung on the Giving Tree in the Narthex with one specific Christmas wish item listed on each tag. Our church sponsored 64 local children and 16 special-need adults. Each child received 3 gifts, and our special needs adults, through the ARC of Delaware, received 2 gifts each. That means we sent 224 gifts to 80 smiling individuals on Christmas Morning. WOW! We have such a wonderful congregation. We are so grateful because without each and every one of you, this may not have been a success. Thank you to those who purchased the gifts, those who helped with supplies, those who spent time writing each gift on each tag and hanging them on the tree. Thank you to our church elves who sorted, organized, wrapped and packed the gifts and to our office staff who were always there when we needed something. We are so blessed to have each one of you as part of our congregation.

## The Membership **Contact Team**

The Membership Contact Team had their first meeting of the new year in January. For those not familiar with this team, the ministry of the team is two-fold. One focus of the team is to reach out to members who have been inactive in the life of the church and attempt to find out why. Have there been illnesses or other physical problems they have been dealing with? Are they watching online? Have they moved outside of the area? Are work schedules getting in the way of taking part in our church ministries? Are they now attending another church? Are there concerns involving the church they would like to share?

Depending on the responses we receive, the team may take a number of different actions. We may encourage the members to once again participate in the life of the church, refer a person to the visitation team, or pass information along to the pastors. Perhaps the member wants to be dropped from our rolls or have their membership transferred to another church. If someone is watching online or has been away for an extended period of time, we will pass on a friendly greeting and make a note of it for our team's records.

The other focus of our team is a more unpleasant one. It is to prepare for the yearly Charge Conference three lists. Those are the I Year Inactive, 2 Year Inactive, and To Be Removed lists. These are lists of members who have not been active in the life of the church for extended periods of time. Contact tries from our team have not been successful in bringing them back into the life of the church. Those listed on the To Be Removed list, are then dropped from membership at the Charge Conference that year.

Enough, though, about the duties of the Membership Contact Team. What I want to touch on now are three ways that the congregation can help out the Membership Contact Team. One is to sign the attendance pads when attending worship. Our team has only six members, split between attending our two Sunday

morning services. We don't know everyone in a church our size. So if someone doesn't sign the attendance pad, and someone on the team doesn't know the person, we may make a call reaching out to find out why we haven't seen that person only to be told, "Oh, I've been

attending." That, of course, can be an awkward situation.


Weekly Offerings

When out in the community if you run into a fellow church member who you haven't seen at church for awhile, tell them you have missed them at church, and if it turns out they haven't been attending, encourage them to return. Your expression of care for them may be just the thing to get them back into our church community.

Finally, our team could use a few more members. We only meet 4 times a year, and the only responsibility outside of attending the meeting is to make a few phone calls, text messages, or emails to reach out to those members we haven't seen for some time.

The sermon in church today, January 14, given by Pastor Rick dealt with the prejudging of an individual without knowing the particulars surrounding that person. An uninformed evaluation of anyone can easily lead to a baseless discriminatory viewpoint of him or her. It's an ugly word, discrimination, that describes the unjust treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, age, sex, and disability. Other realms where discrimination can occur include parental status, religion, national origin, pregnancy, and sexual harassment. I would bet everyone has experienced discrimination of some kind along their life's path.

Growing up in the '50's, our houses in Edgemoor Gardens were homesteads for returning veterans and their families. Our development was an all-white neighborhood. As it turned out, discrimination in Edgemoor was alive and well and not primarily ethnicity related. So, in white Edgemoor Gardens, the discrimination was focused on religion; go figure. Protestants, Jews, and Catholics living amongst each other in societal harmony and all is well... as far as the kids were concerned. As for adults, they "enlighten" the younger on tasteless sayings meant to hurt someone's feelings. Kids are not born with prejudices, they are learned from within a particular group. I sensed that the sayings or quotes we were hearing were meant to inflict hurt on someone. We were guilty of prejudging, I guess, because we were only concerned if a newbie on the block could catch grounders, pass a football, or shoot hoops; not their religion.

Prior to military service, my posture on ethnic differences was difficult to ascertain due to my lack of exposure to other cultures. My schools were all white as was my neighborhood. My exposure to blacks was limited to the four or five times I'd been to Prices Run swimming pool in east Wilmington as a kid. Buzzy's dad would haul us to the pool on summer nights where we'd fork over a dime for a locker and key. Guys would change into their suits and hop into the pool. Everything seemed OK to me; I had no issues with discrimination or racial uneasiness.

A black man, Mr. Aubria Hope, ran the largest garbage hauling fleet in Wilmington back then. On occasion, he and his wife would come to our door in Edgemoor Gardens requesting payment for "services rendered". Mr. and Mrs. Hope were always dressed to the max and the clothes she wore and the jewelry he had on could never be found in our home or on mom or dad. I think we were sometimes delinquent in keeping up with the bills. So, for the first eighteen years of my life, my exposure to African Americans was limited to maybe ten occurrences, but that was about to change.

Having just graduated from High School, not having a plan

forward, and being in possession of the fifth worse academic rating in the senior class, ah yes, I wondered so what's next? I later get a call from, get this, the Mount Pleasant High School main office wanting to know if I'd like to spend some time at the U of D as an enrollee in the Upward Bound Program. How ironic, as much disciplinary time that I served in that school's main office, they now want to send me to college. Jiminy Christmas! I talked it over with mom and I agreed to take their all-expense paid trip into college world for a month.

I arrived at the university and found the meeting locale. I walked into the numbered room and found myself in the presence of all black guys. Man! There were two other white guys, Steve and Jerry from my HS but all the other guys were from inner city schools and Newark High. Not sure about this, but let's give it a shot. My roomie (we were in Russel A dorm) was a guy named Frank and we got along fine. One of the students was a guy named Larry who had a band and performed locally. Another guy, actually a huge guy, named Conway wound up playing for the Washington Redskins and Houston Oilers football teams. But I had a good and rewarding experience at the U of D with these guys in the summer of '66. I wonder if the whole thing was some sort of social engineering program and Larry, Steve, and I were the "token" ten percent. A while back, I attempted to locate Frank to see how he made out. Couldn't find him, but I'd bet he made out just fine.

I offered the notion that we've all been discriminated against along our life's trail. BJ was in a male dominated work environment for thirty years (DelDOT) where professional civil engineers were the hot item for the personnel section. But she was in possession of a Bachelor's of Science degree (business administration) and attacked her work load like a terrier on a rat. Amidst sporadic discrimination, she exceled in all she did and worked her way up to be the Assistant Director of Financial Management and Budget. Yeah wifey!

I encountered the "d" word at a young age and relate now my first encounter with it. My brother Bob (9 yo) and I (8 yo) were playing in the backyard, loving our summer vacation in 1955 and most likely doing the scene where the cowboy shoots the bad guy routine and we each tried to have the most dramatically performed reaction to the fatal shot. Just behind our little lot lived Robin and Harriet. They too were just about our ages. I asked if they'd like to join us in "a shoot-out at the OK Corral." They politely suggested basically that we pack sand and offered "no thanks but thanks for asking." Now Robin said she was having a birthday party that day and would Bob and I like to come. "Wow! Thanks Robin, what time?"

We went in the house and told mom that we'd been invited to Robin's party at 1 PM. She then walked to Woolworths 5 & 10 in the Merchandise Mart and picked up Robin's gift. Bob and I were really excited, come on one o'clock! At a quarter to one, mom combed our hair and off we went to Robin's house just on the other side of the block. As we approached the front door, we heard some kids having a ball inside, party time! We banged on the door and Robin's mother came to greet us. So here we are with grins on our mugs and holding Robin's gift aloft like some form of ritual offering. "Um, come in." she hesitatingly said. We stepped into the hallway and were immediately whisked into the kitchen. But I did see the kids in the living room adorned with skullcaps. The kitchen doors were closed and we were told that Robin should not have invited us. Basically, we were not on the invite list (2 catholic school boys) of Jewish children but "Thanks for stopping by". Bob and I were prejudged to be unworthy to socialize with Robin's other friends based on religious grounds, I guess, and wondered just what the heck was happening here. (ctd. on back cover)

#### The Windshield

For whatever reason, there was a brief time not long ago that my car stood idle in our driveway for a number of days. I forget the exact circumstances. Quite possibly we were away over a long weekend and used an alternate vehicle, but my trusted four-wheeled friend waited patiently for my eventual return to the driver's seat. We're close like that! And my first time back behind the wheel was a late afternoon/early evening reunion of sorts; a drive at dusk to the grocery store, if memory serves. The headlights automatically helped offset the growing dimness as I travelled to and fro. No complaints. Just a nice time with an old friend... I mean, a successful trip to the store!

It wasn't until the day after, in the peak of the sun's mighty presence over greater Camden-Wyoming, did I once again jump in behind the wheel. And to my surprise, to my shock and dismay if I am being honest, the condition of the windshield was simply awful. There were not only smudges in virtually every conceivable direction from behind the wheel, there was also an impressive array of insects, or at least remnants of what used to be intact little creatures, scattered across the glass surface like confetti cast about on a wet sidewalk. It was literally impossible to find even a small surface area not marred by nature's fingerprints. Unlike the early evening trip only a day earlier, this drive was not at all enjoyable, but in fact, one of amazement and frustration. How could this windshield have gotten so dirty? And why did I not see this train wreck of a sight last night when I was behind the wheel? The mission was now clear. The windshield needed to be cleaned, pronto, so that it could actually be a help to me and not a hindrance. And don't worry, the windshield was cleaned and we (the car and I,

of course!) were thankfully back on the best of terms. We need to take care of our friends!

This adventure with the windshield played over in my mind for the next few days. How could the same windshield appear so differently from one early evening to the daylight of

the next day? But the answer, thankfully, was actually quite simple. You see, the dimness, the growing darkness of the late afternoon drive, concealed the smudges and debris that littered the windshield's surface, in essence, allowing them to stay hidden while in plain sight. The car's headlights merely did their job, casting light out in front of the car, but, of course, not backwards onto the car windshield, meaning the dirt and grime was definitely present but not illuminated. I was simply an unaware driver, oblivious to the true condition of the windshield right before my eyes. The true, authentic sunshine, radiating down from above the following day, cast perfect light all around, not just in front of my car like the headlights do. As we know, the sun spreads light everywhere, and it completely filled the windshield with pure light, creating flawless visibility of the windshield's surface, and for our interest today, highlighting the canvas of yuck that I had been unaware of just the day before.

And so why all this fuss about the windshield, apart from the obvious need to clean my car more often and possibly invest a bit more time into my human friends? Well, for starters, the windshield experience helps to highlight for us, on a deeper level, both the importance of pure light, as well as the subtle, illusion-like influence the dark can have on us as we journey in this life. The darkness has the ability to lull us to sleep to the reality right before us, while the clarity of light is inescapable. Have you ever walked through a dimly lit restaurant and wondered why your shoes keep sticking to the floor with every step? Or the realization that at about 4:00 pm in the afternoon, when the sun is setting and coming through your back windows at just the perfect angle, your kitchen



countertops always look a little worse for wear. Quite simply, the darkness conceals what only the light can reveal. While there are a few folks who, maybe due to their work, might drive exclusively when it is dark outside, most us who take the wheel are going to log in plenty of time during the sunny parts of the day.

This means, of course, that most of us are going to be able to recognize the debris as we drive, inhibiting our view and making our journey more difficult, and potentially dangerous. Some of us daytime drivers are merely lazy, thinking it too much effort to actually clean that big, old windshield. And some of us are experts, trained from our youth, at merely putting up with messes around us, not realizing, yet, that as an adult I don't need to tolerate or accommodate things that hinder or frustrate. It's really not that hard, after all, to get a bucket of soapy water, a sturdy brush or rough cloth, and tackle the dirt and grime that has grown comfortable on the glass surface of the windshield. There is definitely some work involved. But there is also the presence of belief at play here... if I clean this surface, I can then see better, and will likely have a more pleasant driving experience. bottom line... the windshield in our car won't get cleaned by itself. The light will merely show me where the work is needed. It is up to us whether we care enough about our windshield to scrub away the dirt that is revealed.

God is light. God is truth. Whether it is in reading Scripture, going to church, engaging in a small group, prayer time, or any other spiritual exercise, it is the light of God that shows us the truth of how we are living while making this

journey of life, and even more importantly, what kind of person we have become along the way. As we have acknowledged on numerous occasions before, God loves us, but too much to do our work for us. God will reveal truth to us if we have the courage to walk in the light, but the question always comes back to us, individually... do we love ourselves enough to deal with what the light is revealing, both in who we are as individuals, and how we are living out our days?

We have a tendency in our humanness to prefer looking outward, evaluating and critiquing others in how they should live. In essence, we can be too comfortable simply using our headlights, filling our time and expending our emotional energy outward, where the cares and distractions of the world are limitless, while our own windshield still awaits the soapy water and scrub brush that only we can apply. It's important to remember a simple yet challenging truth... I can't claim to truly love others with my helpful assistance, when I am not loving myself by first doing my own work. "Loving" others without first tending to myself relegates me to the company of emotional thieves and hypocrites. That may sound harsh, but it is

merely the truth. I don't tell others how best to clean their windshield, so to speak, or take a rag and soap to my neighbor's windshield, when I haven't first tended to my own. Let's not steal a feel good. Let's not sell ourselves as some kind of life expert, promoting a presence that says, "I've obviously got my life in hand, let me reach down and show you how it's done."

You see, when we are looking within, with the penetrating light of God from above, we will be far too humbled to sing our own praises, and with far less time to invest in overdoing our "help" to our neighbor. Paul, the greatest ambassador for Christ that ever lived, said... May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. And Paul also shared in his letter to the Corinthians that the strength of Christ could only be manifest in him if he first acknowledged and lived in the truth of his own weakness. It is clear that Paul was looking honestly at his own windshield, so to speak, and saw much that needed to be cleaned. Yet his message is hopefully clear to us still today; that in cleaning the glass, in doing our own work, more of God's light is actually given room to fill our vehicle, so to speak. Paul could only be increasingly filled with the Lord's spirit by first recognizing the dirt on his own windshield and then getting to work. And thankfully, Paul's model is still viable today for those of us who seek to live out a life of faith. The degree to which God is manifest in our lives is actually dependent on you and me, not God. Once again, God loves us completely. But do we love ourselves enough to do our work and welcome more of His light into our lives? Do we truly hunger for more of His light and less of the din of this world?

We, unfortunately, have no choice in whether we live amidst the darkness of this fallen world, but we do have the gift of choosing whether we let the light of Christ more and more fill our vehicle as we make our way in this life.

May His redeeming light shine increasingly through us to a world in need... Amen



## ... and finally: Ice Cream for Breakfast Day

The informal holiday celebrated on the first Saturday in February when some people deliberately eat ice cream for breakfast!

The holiday was invented on a snowy winter day in the 1960s by Florence Rappaport in Rochester, New York, the mother of six children. It was her youngest two, Ruth (now Kristal) and Joe Rappaport, who inspired her on a cold and snowy February morning. To entertain them, she declared it to be Ice Cream for Breakfast Day. She explained, "It was cold and snowy and the kids were complaining that it was too cold to do anything. So I just said, 'Let's have ice cream for breakfast." The next year, they reminded her of the day and a tradition began. The exact year of the first ICFBD is unrecorded, but it is speculated to be 1966, when a huge blizzard hit Rochester in late January, dumping several feet of snow on Rochester and shutting down schools. When the siblings grew up, they held parties and introduced the tradition to friends while in college, and the tradition began to spread.





We will continue to improve our basic training with the hand held radios for better communication during the services between the Monitors, Stewards, Ushers and Greeters. Printed protocol directions for the camera and door access systems will be reviewed and updated as needed.

#### **Brown Winter Grass?**

To those of you who have wondered and not asked as well as those who have wondered and asked, the questions are basically the same; "Why are large areas of the Church grounds turning brown?" The answer is quite simple.

The entire 9.2 acres that are mowed consist of several acres of turf that are fertilized and treated as well as several

acres of mowed meadow consisting of a variety of forbs and grasses including wire grass that are neither treated nor fertilized. What is called wire grass, which also has several less complimentary names, has a tendency to dormant once the really cold weather of the Fall Season

arrives. Once this dormancy sets in the chlorophyll pigments disappear and the typical brown color becomes highly visible.

With the coming, warming days of the Spring Season the wire grass chlorophyll pigments begin to become more plentiful with the brown colors slowing changing to green. The Church's landscape management plan for 2024 will begin the end of March/first part of April.

I felt like dragging my finger across the top of the birthday cake as we were ushered out of the house. Our early exit was so confusing. Pretty sure it

was an ousting predicated by religious discrimination but the whole concept was unclear at that time. Bob and I both felt what in God's name just happened, almost a Twilight Zone experience with an Alfred Hitchcock ending.

Here's another discrimination episode with a kick butt resolution. I was discharged from the military in August of '70 and attempted to seek employment "back in the world". The following March, I get a phone call from a VA lawyer in Philly asking how my transition back into society was going (you don't want to know). I lied, said all is OK. He asked how my job was going, what job? Joe the lawyer said I had XYZ company listed as my employer prior to USMC service. I told them I stopped by XYZ in late August and asked about my job. They informed me I was not needed. "What?! Stay there, I'll call you in fifteen minutes" says Joe. Sure 'nuff, he calls and tells me to

meet him at XYZ tomorrow at 0900. The next day I introduce myself to lawyer Joe. All the biggies at XYZ are at the meeting. Joe asked the plant secretary if he could see the guest register from last August. Sure thing! Joe points to my signature on August 20 and informs all in attendance that "Mr. Van Kavelaar will receive full pay from the August 20, 1970 to the present March 11, 1971". I got enough to buy a new 1971 455 cu/in Pontiac Bonneville and I parked it in front of the plant managers office all the time to rub it in. My relationship with my employer was, mmm... not too good. And we were in the process of getting the union in... a real mess. But I was prejudged, for what I'm not sure, and found to be unacceptable to be employed in their workplace. All lawyer Joe had to say was the XYZ Company did not want the bad press of their discriminating practice of not hiring back a wounded combat veteran. Oh, and lawyer Joe got my hourly wage increased to \$3.53 from \$2.89 (22% increase).

As previously noted, almost everyone has encountered discrimination of some type. It's hurtful, ugly, and totally uncalled for in our lives. And remember, Mathew writes to us this tidbit of wisdom: "Judge not lest ye be judged." If you're not sure of this bible quote, to me it's an early version of "What goes around, comes around."
