This  $30 \times 65 \times 12$  foot structure will be located near the Visitors Bench at the beginning of the Memorial Garden Walkway and the East Entrance of the Chef's Kitchen.

The construction of the WUMC Pavilion is being undertaken by Yencer Builders, a thirty plus year local builder of high quality homes and commercial structures. Should the reader of this article desire to have a more precise understanding as to the site of the Pavilion you are welcome to visit the Coat Room. Upon your immediate entry into the Coat Room you will find a site plan to your right on the wall. The location of the Pavilion can be discerned on the site plan in what is the southeast quadrant of the property.

In the finest, historical tradition of our beloved WUMC, good folks who felt led by prayerful consideration, answered a call when a need was expressed. In fact, the very presence of our WUMC edifice itself is a testimony to many of us who felt led to support the building of our current church structure. To that end, please know that the forthcoming Pavilion is paid for by generous donations above and beyond the regular Church budget.

Very special thanks go out to the untiring efforts of our WUMC FUNdraising Team who - again with your generous patronage contributed around \$20,000 to this project! Since the **Memorial Garden** will be my final resting place, I and a few others have pondered how we might beautify the area by trying to camouflage the 'big blue monsters' (dumpsters) that create an eyesore for the beauty of the Memorial Garden.



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Plans are now underway to make this happen, combining a fence/gate with some trees around the area. Thanks Higgins, Bill Purdy and to Terry



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# From the Pastors' Desk

I (PR) have always been amazed at how much children understand what you are saying to them even before they can start talking. Hope has only a few words at her disposal, and she only chooses to use them sparingly, but she understands EVERYTHING we say to her! If any of us so much as mention food, she runs to the kitchen in expectation of a snack. If we ask her to pick up her toys, she'll start rounding things up and setting them in a pile. If we mention



bedtime or a nap and she isn't so excited about that, it's an instant meltdown. She loves to look us in the eyes to show that she understands what we're saying, which is always one of the highlights of my day.

The season of Lent is, in effect, our opportunity to grow in our understanding of what God is saying to us. The longer we follow Christ, the greater propensity we have to think that we know everything there is to know about the faith and that we are as "in tune" with the Lord as we possibly can be. Too often we actually tune God out and take our salvation for granted. Lent, then, comes as a six week season where God sits us down to ask, "My child, do you understand?" "I sent my one and only Son into this world to show you the way to live - do you understand? Jesus endured mocking, hatred, anger, and unspeakable pain on your behalf - do you understand?



He bled and died on a cross to atone for your sins so that you can have eternal life and know peace and prosperity - **do you understand?**"

As we walk through this season together, I pray that our hearts and minds are open to comprehend the love and grace of God. I pray that it moves us to a deeper love for our Savior and a greater commitment to serve him. In the words of an ancient prayer, may we keep a holy Lent so that we might say, "Lord, I understand. Thank you, Jesus."



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### National Deaf History Month is

celebrated from March 13 through April 15 to commemorate the achievements of people who are Deaf and hard of hearing. The time frame is spread across March and April in recognition of three turning points in deaf education history dating back to the early 1800s.

- On April 15, 1817, America's first public school for the deaf was opened.
- On April 8, 1864, Gallaudet University the world's first institution dedicated to advanced education for the deaf and hard of hearing was officially founded.
- More than 100 years later, on March 13, 1988, Gallaudet hired its first deaf president in response to its students' Deaf President Now movement.

The National Association of the Deaf (NAD) first introduced National Deaf History Month in 1997, and in 2006, the American Library Association partnered with NAD in supporting and spreading awareness of this celebration. Congress has not designated any part of it as a federally recognized holiday despite ongoing advocacy efforts toward this goal.

#### In celebration of National Deaf History Month, we highlight five role models whose stories illustrate the power of activism, education, and perseverance despite a disability.



Shirley Jeanne Allen, EdD, is the first Black deaf woman in the U.S. to earn a doctoral degree. Born in 1941 in Nacogdoches, Texas, Allen became deaf at the age of 20 following a bout of typhoid fever. At the time, she was studying music at Jarvis Christian College and continued to play the piano for audiences despite her hearing loss. She went on to earn a bachelor's degree in 1966 from Gallaudet

University and a master's degree in 1972 from Howard University. She finally earned her doctorate in education from the University of Rochester in 1992. She was a professor at Rochester Institute of Technology for 28 years before retiring in 2001. Her accolades include being featured in multiple editions of Who's Who of Professional Women, a lifetime achievement award from Who's Who in America, and a place in Jarvis Christian College's Pioneer Hall of Fame.



**Robert R. Davila, Ph.D.,** is a Mexican American who grew up working alongside his parents in the orchards of California's central valley. He became deaf after contracting spinal meningitis when he was 8 years old. His mother was determined that he would receive an equitable education despite his hearing loss and sent him to attend the California School for the Deaf in Berkeley,

California. It was there that Davila learned American Sign Language and other essential skills. He went on to earn a bachelor's and a master's degree in education and eventually obtained his Ph.D. in educational technology from Syracuse University in 1972. Davila became a powerful disability rights advocate and assistant secretary for the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services under President George H.W. Bush. He later served in leadership roles for several organizations dedicated to supporting the Deaf and hard of hearing, including serving as president of Gallaudet University before retiring in 2009.



**Eugene Hairston,** known as "Silent Hairston," grew up to become the first Deaf African American boxer, having suffered spinal meningitis as a young child. Hairston was born in Harlem, New York, in 1929 and attended schools for deaf children until the age of 15, at which point he dropped out to earn money for his family. After working various jobs, he set his sights on becoming a professional

boxer and began attending a New York fighting club. Trainers at the club initially overlooked Hairston because of his hearing loss until they witnessed his exceptional skills in the ring. He soon went pro, winning a total of 45 fights and defeating two world champions before he reached the age of 22. In 1952, doctors advised Hairston to quit boxing for fear he would end up blind from repeated blows to the head. He retired, lived a full life, and died in 2014 at the age of 85.



Juliette Gordon Low was born in 1860 and founded Girl Scouts of the USA in 1912 after enduring multiple ear injuries as a child that resulted in near-total hearing loss. An adventurous spirit, Low channeled her lifelong passions for athletics, the arts, animals, and nature into a global movement that has empowered millions of girls to develop leadership skills and self-confidence. Beginning with her first troop of 18 girls, Low stood up against racism, sexism,

ableism, and other forms of bias by uniting young women from diverse cultural, racial, ability, and socioeconomic backgrounds. After Low died of breast cancer in 1927, she received numerous posthumous honors. These included the establishment of the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund, which provides financial support for international travel and service work for Girl Scouts and Girl Guides around the world.



Audree Norton, born in 1927, was the first deaf actress to appear on American network television. Norton acted in major sitcoms throughout the 1960s and 1970s on ABC, NBC, and CBS. In 1967, she became the founding member of the National Theatre of the Deaf, the first production company to regularly feature performances in American Sign Language. The theatre completed tours

across the U.S. and Europe and was featured on Broadway. Norton's role as a disability rights advocate includes appealing to the Screen Actors Guild after she and her husband Kenneth North, who was also deaf, weren't cast in roles because of a director's fear of working with Deaf/hard of hearing actors. A graduate of Gallaudet University and California State University at Hayward, Norton taught psychology, English, and media at Ohlone College. In 2012, she received an honorary doctorate from Gallaudet. She passed away three years later at the age of 88.

#### When I Am Weak

But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong. 2 Corinthians 12: 9-10

I've started to see the signs. Have you? Trees are beginning to bud, the robins are busy prodding the soil and singing their songs, and the daffodils are poised to make their grand late-winter appearance. Yes, spring is about to burst forth! And before too long, we'll be seeing the familiar return of tractors to our local farm fields, preparing the soil for yet

another growing season. But, as we rural folk know, before a harvest can be enjoyed in the summer or fall, much needs to happen.

For starters, the sleepy winter soil needs to be broken up and turned over so that the sun can provide its warmth, and so the seeds and fertilizer can be received and absorbed. And, of course, rain is necessary, as well as continual cultivation and care along the way. Oh,

and we can't forget time. Crops don't grow overnight, of course, even in the best of soil, and with ideal weather conditions. But if all of these steps are followed, the once hardened ground can be transformed, over and over again, into a literal incubator of growth, sustaining all of us just a little bit longer on this journey of life. What a beautiful process!

And speaking of our life journey, I've been amazed over the years to witness a similar dynamic occur while in my counselor role, not unlike the annual transformation of the farm soil. Have you ever talked to someone who has gone through a challenging time in life, yet is able to experience positives along the way, in spite of the surface difficulties? You see, it is customary for many of us when dealing with an adverse situation to pull back, dig in our heels, and attempt to

> ride out whatever we are facing, not unlike a scary storm that has surfaced and is threatening our home and family. Understandable. This could simply be looked at as a natural human reaction. So if this describes you or me and this is our instinctual reaction to such stresses, we're not bad or wrong, just merely human. But as believers, God desires to not only keep us in His care during challenging times, but for us to grow; to become more than we are; to produce a harvest at the end of a season of difficulty.

To look at this process in another way, stresses and difficulties in life cause us to want to clench our fists, white-knuckling our way through the experience or time period, as we do when driving in a snow shower or when the roads are icy. To override this instinct during stressful

times would be making the conscious choice to open our hands instead, receiving God's special offerings of love and care during our trying time. It may be through a phone call, or a card in the mail, a meeting over coffee, or an email or text message. It could possibly be that quiet walk near the woods or that book that is so inspirational. All components of life are instruments of God and at His disposal, for God created all things.

There are many I have spoken to over the years who have received so much from our Lord during these challenging seasons of life because their "hands" were open enough to receive, not unlike the soil that was broken up and turned over and able to receive the sun's warmth and the rain's refreshment. The soil is prepared every spring because we are confident that growth will eventually occur. We open our hands during life's challenges because we are confident that our God will provide in our time of need.

Look at your own hands. When you make a fist, it's a symbolic position of fighting, resisting, and protecting, fueled often by feelings of fear and anger. Again, we are human beings first. Yet God can bring so much more into our lives during the difficult moments in our life journey if we will only open our hands, letting go of the fear and "what if' concerns that plague us, and instead, choosing to anticipate how God will love us and provide for us in the midst of our season of need. I can only receive if my hands are open. And God loves us too much to pry open our hands; too much to force us to grow. Like the soil, we may be designed for growth and to produce a harvest given that we are indeed "wonderfully made", as captured in Psalm 139, but whether this actually occurs or not is up to you and me, not God.

Life will always have its challenges, and this is where our weaknesses are most

evident, but if our hands are left open, we can then receive the most tangible examples of God's love and care; where His strength is able to steady us and carry us through the stormy times we must encounter as we move through this imperfect life journey. May we begin to see our life challenges less in fear and with clenched fists, and more as spirit-filled opportunities for our God to love and care for us in the special ways only a loving Father can. May our hands remain open to receive, and may our lives produce a harvest to the glory of our God and friend... Amen.

Friday the 26th of January, and I'm outside in a short sleeve shirt picking up the normal winter offerings of the property's maple and birch trees. The leaves are all gone but dead limbs and branches are plentiful. Seventy-two degrees at eleven AM, you have to be kidding me. Some young guy drives by the house in a blue Mustang convertible with the muscle car's top nowhere to be seen; he's cruising. Talk about rushing things, we're only one month into winter but, for dinner, we'll be grilling weenies and burgers in the driveway and having a cold beer. Speaking of a cold beer, think I'll have one now. "A beer before noon?" says BJ. Darn, where did she come from? "I'll put a cocoa puff in it" I responded. "David" she replies. I know that utterance with the rising volume detected throughout the pronunciation of my name. National Register of Historic Places, requires meticulous reconstruction.

Plans are underway to identify and repair the damaged headstones.



The Seder meal is a Jewish meal that has been eaten for thousands of years during the Pesach or Passover festival. It is eaten to remember the Jewish enslavement in Egypt and the quick escape



of the seder with its carefully prescribed ritual makes the dinner quite unlike family dinners held on other types of holidays.

The Seder meal is important because it allows each participant to relive the Exodus as a personal spiritual event. The meal also has symbolic foods that help members of the Seder relive the story of the Exodus.

A Model Seder is the opportunity to explore the traditions and stories from the Old Testament. A Seder is an annual tradition used to pass on knowledge of the Exodus to younger generations in a format that has been in existence for many generations, dating back to the night of the Exodus itself.
