
hymn in American Sign Language at the 9AM Worship service on April 14 in commemoration of National ASL Day: April 15<sup>th</sup>

In 1960, William Stokoe, a scholar and hearing professor at Gallaudet University, published a dissertation that proved ASL is a genuine language with a unique syntax and grammar and changed the course of the history of sign language. The perception of ASL changed from that of a broken or simplified version of English to that of a complex and thriving natural language as functional and powerful as any found in the oral languages of the world. The instruction of ASL as a "foreign language" has become popular and ASL's appeal has only grown. Currently, students can take ASL to meet their high school or college requirements of two years of foreign language study. The ASL in use today is a result of 195 years of Deaf families and students passing down from one generation to next the language that has become the third most used language in the United States.

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# From the Pastors' Desk

I have my own pre-Easter tradition every year. Around Lenten week 5, I dig a hoodie out of my closet, put it on, and wear it for about 14 days straight. It's a delicious shade of mulberry with cream drawstrings and oh so soft fleecy fabric (at this point you're either picturing Pastor Rick wearing the most ridiculous outfit, or you have realized who the actual author is). Now fashion aside, the real reason for my loose Lenten hygiene (hey - 3 kids - I can't promise I wash it once in those 14 days) is for the one word printed on it: *tetelestai*.

#### It's my favorite word.

Hear these words from the Gospel of John: "Later, knowing that everything had now been finished, and so that Scripture would be fulfilled, Jesus said, "I am thirsty." <sup>29</sup> A jar of wine vinegar was there, so they soaked a sponge in it, put the sponge on a stalk of the hyssop plant, and lifted it to Jesus' lips. <sup>30</sup> When he had received the drink, Jesus said, "It is finished." With that, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit." (19:28-30) *Tetelestai* is the Greek word for "It is finished."

If I may ask ... what, exactly, is finished? The crucifixion? The mind-obliterating agony? The crippling anxiety? The humiliation and torture? The suffering? Jesus' earthly ministry? The journey of one's human life? What did Jesus mean? "What" is finished?

In my younger years, I heard those words annually, and I always heard them in the context of the story being written. Jesus says these words and dies - of course He means it is a statement of fact. This is the final breath of His earthly life. It is over. It is finished. In the most poignant of moments we often reach for the simplest of words (think: "help me." "Thank you." "I love you.")

That was my reasoning; but the question still stands ... what is finished? *Tetelestai* comes from the root verb *teleo* which means "to bring to an end, to complete, to accomplish." It conveys initiative and purpose. Instead of a mere "I finished dinner," *teleo* means the successful end to a course of action. It means that one accomplished what one set out to do.

This is where I begin to fall in love with the word; this is where I get chills and tears as the language breaks past our cultural barriers of time and space. We are quickly leaving behind a mortal man's last words on his life and instead we are beginning to hear the revelation of the cosmic. But the revelation is not fully in the root verb - the punch is in the Greek tense. Tetelestai is in the perfect tense. The force of the perfect tense describes an event that has been completed in the past, it has results in the existing present time, and it carries into the future. The past tense looks back at an event and says, "this happened." The perfect tense says, "this happened, this still is in effect today, and this has abiding results into the future." Moreover notice that explanation again - the perfect tense means the action happened in the past! When Jesus says "it is finished" He cannot be referring to the crucifixion, or His suffering, or His dying, because these are in the present. His "it" is referring to something that happened in the past!

#### What is finished??

If the crucifixion is the end of the story, then let us look at the beginning. "In the beginning ...." when God created humanity, humanity made the decision to choose self, power, ego, and control over God. The relational perfection between God and His creation was severed; sin gave birth to death; and humanity was cast out of God's presence. What was eternal peace became tortured, finite existence. What was happiness turned into suffering; what was a future became a hopeless void. How do you live life without God? As far as humanity knew – this was the last word.



Yet as humanity walked away from the One they had willfully and hurtfully rejected - God decided that that would not be the end of the story. He determined that He would bring His lost and forsaken children back to Him. He vowed to conquer the consequences of sin. He pronounced that death itself would die. The moment that God resolved to launch His great redemptive mission to seek and save the lost - it was finished. God's grace and love was established, decided, and completed before Adam and Eve even crossed over the threshold of the garden. It is possible that God's love and grace was completed from the moment He animated dust; does a parent vow to protect, love, and defend an unborn child? As Jesus spoke His final word tetelestai He was affirming that God's redemptive plan had existed from the dawn of time and victory had always been His.

The ancient Greeks boasted of being able to say much in little. "To give a sea of matter in a drop of language" was regarded as the perfection of oratory. What they sought is here found. "It is finished" is but one word in the original, yet in that word is wrapped up the gospel of God. In that word is contained the basis for faith; in that word is discovered the sum of all joy; in that word is held the truth of salvation. It began not with a cross but with a Creator; with a Father whose love is unrivaled and unknown.

April & May 2024

David Van Kavelaar

After church on March 3, we went home and I changed into more comfortable attire, loaded up the dog in the FJ Cruiser, and returned to the north side of the church for some play time with Storm. He seemed to be slightly coughing and did not run around as usual. But we walked around awhile and, detecting he seemed tired, decided to take him home. I told BJ things didn't seem right with Storm. Later, a first; he would not eat his dinner. He seemed sluggish. At 9 PM, he was standing next to BJ in the family room, ears drooping, eyes down cast, and his stomach region was expanding and contracting rapidly. I immediately took him to the animal emergency hospital on Route 10 where the vet said, after a preliminary exam, that he was gravely concerned. After an x-ray was taken, the doctor explained what the results entailed. Storm had an enlarged heart that was surrounded by water; he was dying from congestive heart failure. He gently said that, if Storm was his dog, he'd euthanize him now because a natural ending of the congestive heart failure process is gut wrenching and only prolongs the agony for this wonderful dog. Ten hours after the church service earlier in the day. Storm was put to sleep. I had the vet's assistant shave some of Storm's hair and clip some of his nails for me to take home. Returning home, I felt numb. I had gone through a cruel amputation of sorts, instantly severed from a great friend.

I've been with BJ for close to forty-six years. Never in this time frame have I experienced a more debilitating and crushing experience. I became

physically sick, emotionally drained, and could barely get out of bed. I wasn't eating and, if I was able to get anything down at all, it came back up. I've never been this messed up before; could it be depression? I discounted this idea almost immediately. I may be a lot of things, but (clinically) depressed, no. I may get into a funk, but no depression.

This week, things are much better. Appetites returned with a little more bounce in my step. I was getting back in shape to revive my aggravating ways in pestering my wife. You know, underwear and socks on the floor, keeping the toilet seat up, burping at the dinner table; stuff like that. But rather than boast about my husbandly virtues, we'd like to share a few memories of our friend and guardian.

We acquired Storm from a breeder in Gettysburg back in the Fall of 2017. The photo is of my first contact with the dog who'd be my close companion for

life; he's six weeks old here. We brought him home in early September so let the training begin. We've had seven Dobermans before Storm so we established a regimen (to the best we could) as to potty breaks and, more importantly, where these breaks must occur. He had a 40' x 10' concrete kennel to do his business. Storm caught on fairly quickly but he was being fed three times a day for his first six months, twice a day up to year one, and once a day thereafter. As he improved in his ability to let me know he had to go out, his ability to expand his presence in our home was granted. Before long, he had mastered all we wanted to see in grooming and in hygiene habits. At one year old, and close to one hundred pounds, he now had full access to our home. It should be noted that during the training regimen to get him acclimated to our home and family members, he was training me to be a better master. Boy, I loved that dog.

Storm had a striking profile. A muscular frame with a deep chest that tapered off to a thin waist line, a docked tail, and cropped ears gave the immediate impression that, man; there's a dog! Now I know how another doggie owner sees his pet as the bestest dog in the world; I get it. I felt the same way about Stormy. I would walk him across the front property line; back and forth, but never on to Franklin Street. The reasoning here is to let passers-by know

that the house at 9 Franklin had a formidable hundred-pound package of muscle and teeth living there. Luckily, we've never had problems. I received so many compliments on my dog when I walked him in town; from neighbors to passing motorists. All that training was worth it. I was so proud of him.

Early on, barking came into play. Someone who was walking by, at the door, or making too much noise would incite a barking response. We decided not to discourage this but insisted he be quiet after a minute or so.

BJ has a lot of activities and responsibilities with groups of folks outside the home. Storm was our only four-legged family member, so it was he and I having all this free time to bond. And bond we did. I fed him, bathed him (boy, did he love his spa day!), cleaned his ears and teeth, administered his meds, scrubbed the outside kennel, cleaned his water pails and feed dish, took him to the vet, took him for walks, took him for rides where ever I went and took him to our church every day to play fetch and rope tug in the south field. Oh, did he love church and he and I were there every day it didn't rain.

There is a lady on our church kitchen team who is extremely afraid of dogs, probably as a result of a past unpleasant occurrence. I pleaded with her to meet Storm who basically is just a big love puppy. I couldn't convince her to face her demons. When we sent out the announcement of Storm's passing, the common response was that he was an extremely loving and well-adjusted Doberman.

One of Storm's funniest moments occurred like this. Where BJ sits and reads in the living room, she has this little foot stool that the dog has

seemed to claim. He backs up to it, scooches his butt up onto it, and with his front paws firmly on the floor, stares straight ahead. Well, one evening, there he was as always but his eyelids were growing heavy. BJ frantically waved at me and pointed at Storm. His head was sagging in half inch increments, eyes were closing... closing... and then his front legs gave way resulting in a loud "thump" as his whole body vacated the lofty perch and crashed to the floor. He was shocked, hilarious.

Man's best friend? After coming back from a yummy Mexican meal, I went to the bathroom wondering what kind of burrito I had eaten for dinner. There are warning labels pertinent to certain bathroom functions; something to do with bio-hazard or nuclear waste; something like that. You get the picture. But, oh no, into the bathroom prances Storm, lays down on the bathroom rug, crosses his paws, and stares up at me in adoration as if I was the best thing since the Milk Bone. Are you kidding me, dog?

But Stormy is gone now and we are

wrestling with notions of getting another Dobie, a boxer, or a rescue dog. The Doberman is a high maintenance dog requiring, actually demanding, a lot of its master's time. They play rough. I'm into my upper seventies now and I must realistically assess our ability to repeat the whole training regimen again. My heart is with Dobies, BJ's family had a boxer when she was a teen, son Jeff had a boxer, and my heart goes out to rescue dogs that have been abused or neglected. I cannot watch those ASPCA commercials; they evoke some non-Christian sentiment from me toward the abusers. We'll make a decision on a new family dog later in the Spring.

On Saturday, March 16, Bette and I drove up to the church and walked up to the nearest oak tree in the southern field. I had some hairs and nails from Storm and spread them to the wind and just knew that he would have really appreciated some of his remains had been brought to the site where he and daddy played for hours on end. He really liked his church family, at least those who stopped by to say hi when we played there, and know his spirit will be happy to run and play while being serenaded by the carillon.

Rest in peace, my dear friend. Good bye.







## Staying Close

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. <sup>2</sup> After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. <sup>3</sup> The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread."4 Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.""5 Then the devil took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. 6"If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written:" 'He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."" Jesus answered him, "It is also written: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.""8 Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor. 9 "All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me."10 Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.""11 Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

I can only speak for myself, but it seems to me a rarity that a movie ever rises above the novel that inspired it. In fact, I can't recall one example. And now that I think about it, it seems all too common that the movie falls quite a bit short in comparison. But I do remember one occasion when the movie and the book were equally good... in my humble opinion! I am referring to the Hemingway novel The Old Man and the Sea. I was fairly young when I watched the movie, starring an aging Spencer Tracy, but I recall being mesmerized by the story. It was years later that I read the novel, and of course while there are always differences between the two, not to mention the passing of many years, I thought both the written story and the adaptation for the big screen were both extremely well done. Hemmingway has few peers when it comes to telling a tale about fishing.

It was in thinking of fishing that I began to reminisce about how long ago it had been since I reeled in my last big (actually pretty small) catch. Like a breadcrumb trail, this in turn led me to do some online research into fishing gear that is currently in use, and in particular, hooks and lures. My conclusion... either there have been many incredible and unique advances in the world of fishing, or what I used growing up was pretty basic stuff. Maybe a little bit of both. The hooks viewed online were not totally unusual to me, with their varied sizes and shapes. But the lures

> are what caught my attention. And it wasn't the sheer variety available, for there was an incredible assortment, but the distinctive names they were given, such as... Bonehead Stump Bug, or the Mister Twister Double Tail Grub, or my personal favorite, Mr. Crappie Shoo Shiner. There were hundreds of such lures to choose from, each equipped with a sharp, hard to see hook. Even for us novices, we know how it works... the lure draws the fish in, and if the fisherman, or fisherwoman, attentively does their job, a little nibble from the fish might be just enough to set the hook, and voila, we're having fish for supper!

> In Matthew's Gospel reading above, if we use our imagination, we can see that Satan was much like a fisherman with our Lord while lesus was set apart from God in the desert for forty days, throwing out lures that the evil one hoped would be too enticing to pass up; hoping to set his hook into the soon to be savior of the world. As we know from the story, it was as the forty days were coming to a close that Satan made his move, when lesus was at his weakest. In the scriptures, this section of text is titled, The Temptation of Jesus, and this is indeed Satan's specialty. And while the evil one was unsuccessful in derailing our Lord from his appointed mission, that hasn't discouraged him from continuing his fishing expeditions with you and me.


> There is much we can learn from this account in the gospels, but for the sake of simplicity, let's focus in on just three specific points. For starters, Satan is an expert at zeroing in on Not to overuse the human weakness. metaphor, but the picture of a shark sensing blood in the water comes to mind. And while the evil one has keen awareness of our weaknesses as we make our way in this life, the vital question for us today is whether we have such awareness about ourselves. To walk through this life unaware of one's weaknesses is not unlike the actions of a drunk driver. While all drivers are vulnerable to crash their car, it is the drunk driver who chooses to increase the

risk, all the while telling themselves that they are not in danger. It is this type of ignorance of self, or denial of reality, that makes a person such an easy mark for the evil one. On the other hand, it is our recognition of our weaknesses that keeps us humbly aware of our precarious steps along life's path. It was the Apostle Paul who proclaimed to the Corinthians, "For when I am weak, then I am strong".

It is when we are honest with ourselves, and with God, about our human frailty, that the Spirit is permitted access to actually strengthen us in our times of weakness...hence I am made strong in Him when I am not strong in myself. In a picture, the weak area of me is infused with the Spirit and made strong. Conversely, if my weaknesses are avoided and denied, the Spirit is not given access, because God doesn't just storm in when not invited, and my weakness is feasted upon by the evil one. That sounds terrible, and looks horrible to imagine, but it is the truth. Whether we fall prey to our weaknesses through the lure of temptation is ultimately up to you and me.

Secondly, when we read the gospel account above, it is not merely the fact that Jesus was victorious over Satan, it was how he was victorious. Jesus' weapon was the Word. With every precise cast of the line, Satan dangled an attractive lure in easy reach of the weakened lesus. And to protect himself, to give himself the strength to combat and resist the tempter. lesus quoted the razor-sharp. unbreakable Word of God. Again, Paul's words come to mind, "For when I am weak, then I am strong." Our strength, in times of need, when we are vulnerable and weary, is the constancy of God's word. Many of us don't do this, but if we were to take the time to be truly honest with ourselves, we could see pretty clearly where we are most vulnerable as it relates to temptation. We are all vulnerable... let's begin with that truth. And if we can be honest with ourselves, we can then turn to the Word and remind ourselves of God's truth, God's protection, and God's power.

#### March 13 – April 15

National Deaf History & Heritage Month is celebrated from 3/13 thru 4/15 to commemorate the achievements of people who are Deaf and hard of hearing. The time frame is spread across March and April in recognition of three turning points in Deaf education history dating back to the early 1800s.:

**On April 15, 1817, America's first public school for the Deaf was opened.** The establishment of the American School for the Deaf was the beginning of a long proud tradition of schools for the Deaf in this country, which continues to this day. Prior to this date, children who were Deaf or hard of hearing were kept at home and rarely educated. With the founding of this, the first of many Schools for the Deaf, children were given access to a language, a community, and a culture. Preservation of these schools is of paramount importance to the community.

On April 8, 1864, Gallaudet University, the world's first institution dedicated to advanced education for the Deaf and hard of hearing, was officially founded. Gallaudet University is a central icon within the community, representing the only university in the world that is solely for Deaf and hard of hearing students. The university was certified under the direction of President Abraham Lincoln, a staunch supporter of the Deaf community and education.

On March 13, 1988, Gallaudet hired its first Deaf president in response to its students' Deaf President Now movement. March 13 represents the day that the Deaf community seized its fate during the Gallaudet University "Deaf President Now" movement. The college board of directors selected a new president for the college who was hearing, had no experience in Deaf education, and did not know American Sign Language (ASL). Students and staff walked out of classes and off the job in protest. When Gallaudet selected its first Deaf President, I. King Jordan, Deaf citizens declared that never again would they not be allowed to lead themselves.



In a manner of speaking, we can take these special promises and encouragements from the Word and weave them into the "sweater" that we wear in this life, especially in times of needed warmth (help). If Jesus confronted the evil one with the power and strength of the ever present Word, so can we. As far as the East is from the West... nothing can separate us from our loving God, unless we choose to walk the roads of life without Him.

Lastly, Jesus, in Matthew's account, exemplifies what trust truly looks like as it relates to God. No matter how hard Satan tried to lure Jesus into accepting what he was offering, Jesus remained steadfast in his belief and trust in the Father's protection and care; knowing that the Father would not abandon him, but in fact take care of him in his time of need. As the closing verse describes, "Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him."
