From the Pastors' Desk

February is invariably the month when our thoughts turn to

100€. The dreary grey of January is quickly replaced with the bright red and white of Valentine's Day. We actually have a good excuse to have boxes of chocolate laying around the house, cards are bought and sent, dinner dates are planned, and love is celebrated. Retailers love this time of year, and to be honest, so do I (PR). Being in love and celebrating that love are wonderful things.

This is a perfect time to read Paul's words in I Corinthians 13. Just the mention of that passage brings one thing to mind: weddings. Paul's stirring words are paired up with lace, flowers, tuxes, and tears. It's not that the topic of Christian love is out of place at a wedding - the best marriages include Christ every day, but that's a topic for another time - but it's just that these words have so much more to offer us.

The lead-in to 1 Corinthians 13 is actually the last verse of Chapter 12: "And yet I will show you the most excellent way." Paul intends to show us the most excellent way to honor Christ and serve him. We do that by showing God's love to the world. The late that Paul is talking about isn't temporary affection. It isn't fleeting butterflies in our stomachs. It isn't a passing fancy. Instead, it is deep, rooted, committed love. It is law for others that meets all the criteria spelled out in Chapter 13: patient, kind, not boastful, and not proud. It is not easily angered or self-seeking, but rather a love that embraces the other, lets him or her know they are $\int 0000$ by both God and

The next two Outreach Team's FOOD DRIVES

will be held on **February 8**th and **March 8**th. We would like to thank everyone who donated generously to this important initiative throughout 2024. During the past year we transported 12 pickup loads, and 6 SUV loads of provisions to the **Central Delaware Interfaith Alliance Food Bank**.

We see many of the same people on the 2nd Saturday of each month from 10 am to 12 pm. Most of the donations come from our church community; however, several members of the surrounding community donate, as well.

The Central Delaware Interfaith Alliance has provided the following

statistics to show the impact of their food distribution on families in Kent County:

In 2024 -

1,478 households were assisted. These households included 3,436 adults and 3,491 children. The Food Bank generally provides two weeks of groceries per family on a quarterly basis if needed. Thus, some families receive groceries four times per year.

The Food Bank keeps records of their distributions to help ensure that they serve as large a population of needy families as possible.

The Food Bank served 300 more families in 2024 than they did in 2023!

Again, we wish to express our gratitude for your donations on behalf of the families served. It is our hope to serve even more of our needy neighbors in 2025.

Please plan to donate on February 8th and as often as you can in 2025! Non-perishable food items can also be dropped off in the narthex during church opening hours 9 am to I pm Mondays through Fridays if the second Saturday of the month is inconvenient.

Finally, some members of our church make monetary donations to the Food Bank because it is easier for them. The best way to do that is to write a check to Wyoming UMC with 'Food Bank' on the memo line. Your donation will then be recorded by the church and passed on to the Food Bank.

New Years Eve

"Pass the crossword puzzle from the newspaper, please." BJ puts the Hallmark movie on pause to dig out the paper's puzzle section. We're in our jammies at 2100 (9 P.M.) and settled in for the evening on New Year's Eve. The warmth from the fire place and Zeus's quiet snoring on his TV bed is lowering the

chances we'd make it to the bewitching hour of midnight. New Years Eve had always been a party event for me, not so anymore. But there was this one New Years Eve...

Back in '69, I was scheduled for R&R (rest and relaxation) and thankfully left the bush in Viet Nam. Four months of combat action earned me the right to leave my marine brothers of Echo 2/7. It was December 31, 1969 ...

...and a new decade was two hours away when we landed in Taipei, the capital of Taiwan. As we disembarked from the plane and walked on the tarmac leading to a receiving building, the night was immediately and seemingly punctuated by automatic gunfire. Every marine hit the deck and began praying that this was just some sort of unreal nightmare. We had no weapons to return fire but, as it turned out, it was only some guy who threw a string of fire crackers nearby as they too were celebrating New Years Eve. One of the baggage handlers was loudly laughing at the forty marines as they cautiously arose from the prone position and began standing up. Another handler elbowed the laughing guy in the ribs quite forcibly; he understood why we immediately got down. Despite that harrowing beginning, let's just say the evening went great. One week lies ahead at the Happy Hotel and Fox Bar, both would do wonders for me.

Later that week, I was walking with my new friend in downtown Taipei and the Taiwanese quard (not sure what their real title was) was lining the boulevard. I locked eveballs with this one guy, he was like stone, quite impressive really. As it turned out, Vice President Spiro Agnew was there to converse with Taiwanese officials. Also that New Year's week I wanted to buy some gifts for folks back home. The shopkeeper gave me the cost for two swords and a hand carved chess set. My friend tore into him like a shark on a tuna and, although I don't understand Chinese, saw she had put him in his place. She told him that I should have a fair cost and, if he didn't follow her demand, she would inform her friends to not bring their dates to this particular shop. After a wonderful New Years Day and week in Taiwan, reality raised its ugly head when I returned to Fire Support Base Ross on January 7. The day before (January 6), the enemy attacked Fire Support Base Ross and thirteen marines were killed. As our chopper descended to the Ross landing zone, thirteen poncho-covered bodies were seen laid out on the tarmac awaiting their departure to Danang for processing. A terrible way to start a new decade. That was fifty-five years ago.

The Hallmark flick had just ended and the clock informed us that the New Year was just one hour away. "Hey, how about some popcorn?" The aroma of a couple of Act II popcorn bags out of the micro-wave unfortunately had woken our Doberman Zeus from a sound sleep. We arranged some living room furniture so that Jaws could not interfere with our munching.

"Let's watch an old Matlock." It was a recorded show so that BJ could zip through the commercials, so we began viewing Andy Griffiith as a shrewd Atlanta lawyer; I always liked that guy. As New Year approached, this one New Year's Eve came to mind.

Some New Year's Eve back in the '80's, my brother Bob and his wife Claire, BJ, and I went to the Ground Round on the Philadelphia Pike in Wilmington. We had friends in the band that was providing the evening entertainment for a pretty well-packed audience. The beer was flowing and the band actually started to sound better. The partying mindset was immediately drowned out as a waitress spilled a couple mugs of beer on the two ladies of my group. This spillage prompted the necessity for Bob and I to temporarily strip the title of "ladies" from our wives. What the wives were muttering under their breath could be attributed to BJ's dad being a sailor and Claire's dad, a merchant marine. Enough said. Anyway, the girls gussied themselves up, made themselves presentable again, and we continued our partying at the Hall-Burke VFW Post. Happy New Year, y'all! And, of course, Bette and Claire became ladies again, just like that. Amazing!

It was now ten minutes to midnight. We put the furniture back in place and stood up to allow any residual popcorn crumbs to fall to the floor. Zeus immediately went into action and cleaned the area; "Good job boy!" We sat down and, holding hands, awaited the ball dropping at the Time Square event. Zeus was getting jumpy as fireworks outside could be heard. Looking out the door, I could see the psychedelic colorful burst of these celebratory rockets which immediately brought back this memory.

To be honest, I'm not sure of the year when this New Year's Eve party occurred. It was one of the early '70's I'm sure and things were slowly getting out of control for me. My brother's small apartment held about twenty-five folks and individual partying rituals were well under way. Lava lamps, incense, and The

Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band album that was playing on the stereo added to the festivities. All of a sudden, all lights and the stereo were turned off. "Hey, what's happening" could be heard throughout the apartment. A strobe light was then turned and a voice responded: "And now ladies and gentlemen, for your evening entertainment, please welcome Johnny Sands!" A few people clapped as Johnny walked to the

center of the room. Because of that darn strobe light, his journey to the room's center was like watching a disjointed old-time movie. Johnny held up his right hand, extended his index finger and then lit his lighter-fluid soaked finger on fire! The ooh and aah sayers were stunned but were not prepared for the final act which followed. With his finger still ablaze, he squeezed a Ronson lighter fluid can so that the stream of fluid reached his lit index finger. A huge fire ball enabled the apartment living room to be brightly lit up as if it was day time. Although the fire ball lasted for only a few seconds, its effect was enough to blow the minds of half the attendees. Everyone was trying to deal with what had just occurred, but I was watching Johnny trying to blow out the flame on his finger. He brought his finger close to his mouth to blow the flame out but, don't you know, he caught his beard on fire. Some people applauded thinking this was part of the evening's entertainment act as Johnny fled from the room. He ran to the bathroom and, believe it or not, put his face in the toilet, flushed, and immediately eliminated the danger. Johnny went into the bathroom looking like a true hippie, and ten minutes later, came out with a clean-shaven Mr. Business Man look. Jiminy Christmas, no more of those parties, thank you!

The Times Square crowd was in a frenzy as the huge ball slowly approached ground zero and the beginning of 2025. As the ball completed its journey downward, Bette and I held hands. "Happy New Year, lovey!" I said. "You too, babe!" she responded. As we stood to wrap things up, a hug and a kiss was certainly in order. The fire place was secured, pillows rearranged, soda glasses and popcorn bags were brought into the kitchen, lights then turned off, and we were off to bed with the ever-present Zeus close behind.

Like all families, we have some issues to confront and medical issues requiring pending procedures. We are truly optimistic that, with

God's presence, we can get through these trying times. To all our church family, from BJ and me, may you all have a happy and blessed New Year!



Solar Power Task Force Update

IT'S OFFICIAL! At the All-Church meeting on Monday, January 13th, those in attendance voted unanimously to approve the construction of a solar ground mount array. As an update for everyone involved with our church, here are some key facts and figures:

- The size of the system is 168 cells (panels) and is expected to be located in the field behind the north parking lot or north side of the building. It will have a fence around it.
- Total cost of the system is \$278,300 which will be paid out of our cash reserves.
- The church will receive a \$35,000 Delmarva Power Incentive for the system and a Federal grant of \$83,490 which will bring the net cost after incentives down to \$159,810.

- The year I electric savings for the church will be about \$11,000.
- If the annual electric rate of inflation is 1%, the 30 year savings will be about \$355,000. If the annual electric rate of inflation is 3%, the I savings will be about \$482,000. If the annual electric rate of inflation is 5%, the savings will be about \$668,000. Electric rates due to increased demand are expected to go up significantly.
- Estimated years to breakeven are 12 (at the 3% electric inflation rate).

• The environmental impact will see our solar power system offset about 98 tons of CO2 per year (or about 207 barrels of oil).

The next steps for the Solar Task Force Team is to finalize the contract and come up with some fundraising ideas to help the church replace some if not all of the \$159,810 net cost for the project. Thank you to the Fundraising Team who have already committed \$20,000 to the cost of the project.

Stay tuned for further updates on the progression of the project.



Habitat Faith Build



How Our Calendar Came to Be

Today, we follow the Gregorian calendar, but it's based on the ancient Roman calendar, believed to have been invented by Romulus, who served as the first king of Rome around 753 BC.

The Roman calendar, a complicated lunar calendar, had 12 months like our current calendar, but only 10 of the months had formal names. Basically, winter was a "dead" period when the government and military weren't active, so they only had names for the time we think of as March through December.

- March (Martius) was named for Mars, the god of war, because this was the month when active military campaigns resumed.
- May (Maius) and June (Junius) were named for goddesses, Maia and Juno.
- April (Aprilis) is thought to stem from the Latin aperio, meaning "to open" a reference to the opening buds of springtime.

- The rest of the months were numbered; their original names in Latin meant the fifth (Quintilis), sixth (Sextilis), seventh (Septtilis, September), eighth (Octilis, October), ninth (Novilis, November), and tenth (Decilis, December) month.
- Eventually, January (Januarius) and February (Februarius) were added to the end of the year, giving all 12 months proper names. January was named after Janus, the Roman god of beginnings and transitions.

When Julius Caesar became *Pontifex* Maximus, he reformed the Roman calendar so that the 12 months were based on Earth's revolutions around the Sun. It was a solar calendar, as we have today. January and February were moved to the front of the year, and leap years were introduced to keep the calendar year lined up with the solar year.

The winter months (January and February) remained a time of reflection, peace, new beginnings, and purification. After Caesar's death, the month Quintilis was renamed July in honor of Julius Caesar in

44 BC, and later, Sextilis was renamed August in honor of Roman Emperor Augustus in 8 BC.

Of course, all the renaming and reorganizing meant that some of the months' names no longer agreed with their position in the calendar (September to December, for example). Later, emperors tried to name various months after themselves, but those changes did not outlive them!





February comes from the Latin word *februa*, which means "to cleanse." It was named after Februalia, the Roman festival of purification, which was a month-long festival of purification and atonement that took place this time of year. Are you curious about the naming of the rest of the months?

I am grateful for my family and friends, those I see regularly and those who are always in my heart. I am grateful for my sweet kitties who are sleeping all around me as I type this

message.

part of the world to be less frightening. I hope for my part of the world to find more joy and peace. I am optimistic that this can make a change in my life and, hopefully, in the lives of those with whom I am close.

For 2025, I am striving to cleanse myself of negative, non-constructive thoughts and actions. I am turning my gaze towards the positive, productive aspects of the world and the people around me. I am seeking to find a way to keep my head above the waters of anger and division that seem to swirl around too many of us. I am optimistically looking to find myself, my world, my joy, my peace, my hope, my gratitude on the other side of the mirror.



Sharing God's Bounty

Have a Heart

February: the month devoted to love. Stores are filled with heart-shaped boxes of candy and heart-shaped cards and vases of flowers with heart-shaped gift tags. All this is available for the consumer so that he can find the appropriate expression of his devotion to his loved one. If that expression of love has been preceded by a year of thoughtful and loving words and deeds, it is welcomed and cherished by the recipient. If not, it is just an empty ritual, done out of duty rather than true devotion.





Stewardship is serving, helping, giving, but love is the basis for stewardship. Without love, our good deeds are empty and without merit. The first act of true stewardship is to "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5). Jesus called this the most important commandment (Mark 12:29,30). With that love for the Lord in us, we are enabled to be good stewards. Then we can do acts of good stewardship, acts of true devotion. We are enabled to...

- "Give generously to him and do so without a grudging heart" (Deuteronomy 15:10).
- "Carefully observe [his decrees and laws] with all your heart and with all your soul" (Deuteronomy 26:16)
- "Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality" (Romans 12:13)
- "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men" (Colossians 3:23)

God, through Ezekiel, promised, "I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you: I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws." (Ezekiel 36:26-27). This promise he has fulfilled in his Son, Jesus, who has followed his Father's decrees and kept his laws for us. As we strive to live fruitful lives of stewardship, at the same time, we rest in Christ who has been the perfect steward for us.



Tithing is an outgrowth of a sense of thankfulness. Since God's mercies are constant and unfailing, our response should be of the same nature in proportion to our ability. The "grace of gratitude" has high rating in the Christian standard of virtues. It is developed by saying "Thank you" to God. At the entrance of life abounding stands the cross of self-denial.
