



## **From the Pastors' Desk**

Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. - Hebrews 13:2

The call to show hospitality is central to our faith - it is both a means of inviting others as well as receiving the invitation of friendship and love. I was powerfully reminded of the grace-filled power of hospitality during my time in Guatemala.

On Monday we were working on the home of a local resident that needed a new roof. Her roof was rusted through and leaking, so in pretty short order we removed the old metal and started to put on the new corrugated panels. As we were working, the grandmother of the family walked down the hillside to the nearest tienda (store) that sold fresh fruit and brought

back a watermelon. She cut it up and then came over to the room where we were working and held out a plate, saying "Para ustedes" (for you all). Now, this watermelon was perfectly ripe and delicious, but what was more moving was this act of love, appreciation, and welcome. It was a simple gift, but it meant everything to us as we worked.

Later in the week, we were helping to install a stove at the home that we built that week for Angela. While we were working, her grandmother went across the street to the tienda and brought back a 2-liter bottle of Pepsi and several bags of cheese curls. As an aside, soda is cheap in Guatemala (the 2 liter only cost about 50 cents US) and each bag of cheese curls cost .13 cents US. The value didn't matter; what did matter what this act of love and blessing. When she gave them to us, you



could see the appreciation and joy in her eyes, along with a hearty "Gracias!" for all we were doing.

Hospitality breaks down barriers and lets others know they are seen, valued, and included. Who are you making space for in your family? Who are we making space for in our church? God is imploring us to extend that welcome and hospitality, to let all know they are loved.

Please come together with family and friends along with other area churches for our annual


5K WALK FOR WATER Saturday April 26, 2025







Sam believed it was God who sent Ernie Cantwell, the only African American kid in his class, to be the friend he so desperately needed. And that it was God's idea for Mickie Kennedy to storm into Our Lady of Mercy like a tornado, uprooting every rule he'd been taught about boys and girls. Forty years



An evocative tale of two best friends whose bonds are both strengthened and tested over decades by forces beyond their control. Set largely on the remote Korean island of Jeju, the story follows Young-sook and Mi-ja, girls from strikingly different backgrounds who bond over their shared love of the sea. Working in their village's all-female diving collective, the friends come of age in a community where gender roles are anything but typical. Women are the primary bread-winners, the heads of household in all but name, and yet, as Mi-ja and Young-sook realize, there are limits to their control that can prove devastating.

And now Marcellus must use every trick his old invertebrate body can muster to unearth the truth for her before it's too late. Shelby Van Pelt's

## Solar Power Task Force Update

Our solar power array project continues to move forward. The project manager from Paradise Energy Solutions (the firm who will be constructing the array) came out to the church to meet with the task force team and do a walkthrough explaining the electrical connections and discussing exactly where the array would be located. The plan is for the solar array to be located in the field east of the north parking lot. The panels will be arranged in 3 rows and have a fence around the array. The engineers are currently writing up the plans for submission for the permits. The approximate start date for construction is 15 to 20 weeks after the signing of the contract which took place in January. Once construction begins, it will only be about two weeks until construction is completed. I am thinking it will be completed by sometime in late spring.

The task force met again on February 12th. At that meeting it was decided that a site plan display would be made and placed in the narthex, so the entire church would have a visual of where and what the solar array would look like. Once the array is finished, we also plan to have a display of the savings generated by our solar field month by month. Also groundskeeping was discussed with different ideas brought forth for care of the grounds underneath the array. Members of the team will be on a fact finding mission over the next month to ascertain which ground cover to use and how to best take care of maintaining the ground cover. For security, a camera will be added to our existing system that will take Finally, the team began a discussion of fundraising. Once again, the solar array is being paid from the church's cash reserves. We do not need to borrow any money. However, the plan is to fundraise to replace the money taken from those reserves. The total cost of the project is \$278,300. The church will receive a \$35.000 Delmarva Power Incentive for the system and a Federal grant of \$83,490 which will bring our net cost down to \$159,810. Watch for updates on how you may contribute to the solar project. Once again I wish to thank the Fundraising Team who has already pledged \$20,000 to the project.



It's all in a Day's Work or

What's In A

Name?

Last month, we learned about the origin of our months' names. What about the names of the days of the week?

The names originated with the ancient Romans, who used the Latin words for the Sun, the Moon, and the five known planets! Our English names also reflect the influence of the Anglo-Saxons (and other Germanic peoples).

In naming the seven days of the week as checkpoints in time, the ancient Romans chose seven celestial bodies that could be seen with the naked eye: the Sun, the Moon, Mars, Mercury, Venus, Jupiter, and

Saturn. For example, Sunday is the Sun's day, and Monday is the Moon's day.

Regarding the English names we use today for days of the week, we can also see the influence of the Anglo-Saxons and the old German gods. For example, *Wednesday* comes from Woden, the Anglo-Saxon king of the gods; in Saxon, the name is *Wodnesdaeg*. (Now you know why Wednesday is spelled that way!)

In the Saxon Language:

marriages, and fertility.

Sunday was named Sunnandaeg or Sun's day, Day of Sun. Monday was named Monandaeg or Moon's day, Day of moon. Tuesday was named Tiweddaeg or Tiw's day. Tiw was an Anglo-Saxon god of war. Thursday was named Thursdaeg or Thor's day. Thor was a Norse god of thunder, lightning, and storms. Friday was named Frigedaeg or Frigga's day. Frigga was a Norse goddess if home,

**Saturday** was named Saeterndaeg or Saturn's day. Saturn was an ancient

Roman god of fun and feasting.


- The seven-day week started with the first civilizations of the Middle East. Mesopotamian astrologers designated one day for each of the seven most prominent objects in the sky-the Sun, the Moon, and the five major planets visible to the naked eye.
- The Jews also adopted a seven-day cycle, based on the time it took the Lord to create the universe as reported in Genesis. A new wrinkle in their week was the Sabbath, a day set aside for rest. This was the first time a culture had invented a holiday that occurred on a regular basis, unrelated to natural phenomena. As in ancient times, the Sabbath begins at sunset and concludes at sunset, mimicking the description of a day in Genesis 1:3.
- The Romans adopted different weeks for business reasons; they thought of a week as the 8 days between market days.

- West African societies preferred a four-day market cycle.
- In Assyria, 6 days was the rule; in Egypt, 10; in China; 15.
- The ancient Germans used a five-day cycle named for their primary gods which is how our week ended up honoring Norse deities like Tiw (Tuesday), Odin (Wednesday), Thor (Thursday), and Frigga (Friday). Our word week may come from the Old Norse word vikja, which means "to turn." Sunday and Monday, or course, honor the Sun and the Moon.

Atheistic revolutionaries tried, unsuccessfully, to get rid of the seven-day week. In 1793 the leaders of the French Revolution produced a new calendar divided into three ten-day "decades." It never caught on, and Napoleon abandoned it in 1805. In 1929 the Soviet Union tried a five-day week, with one day of rest.

- Instead of the traditional day names, the days were given colors: yellow, orange, red, purple, and green.
- In order to keep mass production going, each Soviet citizen was assigned a different day of rest, so that a husband might have a yellow day off, while his wife took her leisure on green.
- Due to mass confusion, the plan was revised in 1932 to a six-day week, with numbers replacing the colors. By 1940, the Russians were back on the familiar seven-day cycle!

Somebody was always trying to come up with something better! In 1936 the League of Nations solicited proposals for world calendar reform and considered almost 200 different schemes, many of which rearranged the week.

Edward Skille of Drummund, Wisconsin, suggested a year consisting of 73 five-day weeks called "metos." The days of the week would be called Ano, Beno, Ceno, Deno, and Eno.

Why the seven-day week? It doesn't divide evenly into 365- or 366-day years, so that holidays fall on different days of the week from year to year.

But human beings are not logical creatures. Who can imagine saying, "What are you doing next purple?" or "Yeah, it's Eno!"

## Bearing Fruit for Jesus - A Fruitful Life

"No good tree bears bad fruit, nor does a bad tree bear good fruit. Each tree is recognized by its own fruit. People do not pick figs from thornbushes, or grapes from briers. A good man brings good things out of the good stored up in his heart, and an evil man brings evil things out of the evil stored up in his heart. For the mouth speaks what the heart is full of." Luke 6:43-45

Through all his many years of coaching the Dallas Cowboys, Tom Landry was one of the winningest coaches in pro football. After all those years as a coach, you'd think he would have learned something about leadership – and indeed he did. Someone asked him, once, to describe the essence of leadership. Landry replied, "Leadership is getting someone to do what they don't want to do in order to help them achieve what they want to achieve."

That little proverb works well on the gridiron, but it also happens to work well in the church sanctuary: especially in the activity in which we're now engaged together – this activity known as preaching.

It takes two to tango, as they say, but it also takes two to preach – or at least two. You need one person to preach, and another to listen – although there are usually a good deal many more listeners than that.

Preaching is getting someone to do what they don't want to do in order to help them achieve what they want to achieve. There are certain things our Lord calls us to do, as his disciples, that we don't especially want to do. But it's important for us to do them if we're going to achieve our goal of fully living into our calling as disciples of Jesus Christ.

High up on the list of things most of us don't especially want to do is the activity known as stewardship – or, financial giving. Who wants to part with their hard earned money? The fact is, we need to part with some, as challenging as that is for each one of us, if we want to achieve our goal of becoming faithful disciples of Jesus Christ. Giving is not incidental to Christian discipleship, nor is it an elective option. Giving our time, talent, and our treasure are fundamental pillars of our Christian beliefs.

If you check your Bible concordance, an index to the Bible, you'll see the word "give, giving, giver" occur no fewer than 2,162 times. Much more than words like believe, pray, even love.

Let us pray for the desire to be good stewards of the gifts God has given us to further His kingdom.
